

ANTICIPATES RECURRENCE OF "FLU" IN MILD FORM

Surgeon-General Blue Thinks Officials Should Prepare for Return of Epidemic.

WAS NOT FRESH IMPORTATION

Last Winter's Outbreaks Had Extensive Forerunners for Several Years, Causing Increased Pneumonia Mortality in Country.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—"Will the flu come back this year?" This question being asked by thousands of scientists and millions of laymen throughout the world is discussed by Surgeon-General Blue of the Public Health Service in an official bulletin in which it is said that the plague probably will not recur, but in not as severe a form as last winter. "Probably, but by no means certainly, there will be a recurrence of the influenza epidemic this year," says General Blue. "Indications are that should it occur, it will be as severe as the epidemic of the previous winter. Officials and State and city boards of health should be prepared in the event of a recurrence of the epidemic of influenza in a serious form." The fact that previous attacks being immunity in a certain percentage of cases, and that the part of those affected in the previous epidemic influenza is spread by direct and indirect contact. It is not certain the germ has been isolated or discovered, and as a consequence there is no positive preventive except the enforcement of rigid rules of sanitation and the avoidance of personal contact.

Not a Freak Importation.
"Contrary to the opinion expressed frequently during the early weeks of last year's outbreak by a number of observers, the studies of the Public Health Service indicate that the epidemic was not a fresh importation from abroad. Careful study of the mortality statistics of the United States shows that there were a number of extensive though mild forerunners during the previous three or four years.

"Concerning the important question of immunity conferred by an attack of influenza, the evidence is not conclusive, but there is reason to believe that an attack during the earlier stages of the epidemic confers a considerable but not absolute immunity in the latter outbreak.

"Despite the fact that there is still some uncertainty as to the nature of the micro-organism causing influenza, one thing is certain, that the disease is communicable from person to person. Moreover, building from experience in other diseases it is possible that the germ, whatever its nature, is carried about not only by those who are ill with influenza, but by persons who may have been in contact with them, and therefore should be regarded as a factor in spreading influenza.

Look for Local Outbreaks.
"It seems probable, however, that we may expect a local recurrence in the near future with an increase over the normal mortality from pneumonia for the next few years, and certainly we should be as far as possible, prepared to meet them by the enforcement of rigid rules of sanitation and the avoidance of personal contact.

FREEMAN PRAISES "BABE" RUTH, KING OF SLUGGERS

Former Holder of Home-Run Record Says He Couldn't Swing Like Big Red Sox Player.

TOLEDO, Sept. 12.—"I was convinced several weeks ago that Babe Ruth would at least equal, if he did not surpass, my home-run record," said "Buck" Freeman when he learned the Red Sox slugger had made his twenty-sixth home run and had broken the major league record established by him twenty-one years ago. Freeman is now in Roger Bresnahan's office, after a recent game recalled his record-breaking performance.

"The record was made in 1899, when I was a member of the Washington National League Club," said Buck. "Many fans and baseball writers had the impression that I was then with the Boston team, but that is wrong. I never could hit as hard as Ruth does. I couldn't take a swing like the big fellow because I didn't have the physique."

"Buck, you were a choppy hitter," put in Bresnahan, who is now the manager of the Toledo club, "but you put a lot of punch behind the war club. Say, if you were as big as Ruth there is no telling what you might have done that year."

"When I was sent to Boston," continued Freeman, "I thought it would be a record because of the short right field fence on the Boston grounds, but I was mistaken. Maybe trying to pull the ball over that fence hurt my batting, for I certainly fell off."

"I made my record against some great pitchers, Ruth and several other famous pitchers tried to fool me. But it cannot be denied that today there are more great pitchers in the game than when I was playing, and batting has improved, too. The great hitters of twenty years ago would be helpless before the spitter and some of the other deliveries now used by pitchers."

"I must congratulate Ruth upon his great work. It's wonderful for a man to break a record that has stood for twenty years, especially in the face of the fact that American League pitchers have been working their hardest against Ruth all season and passing him almost every time he was up there in a pinch."

"Look at Ruth's record and you will see at once he is a real batter, not a freak. The fact that he is a home-run hitter merely proves he has the faculty of meeting the ball squarely with equity of his arm, strength back of his swing. Look at Ruth's wrists and you will find they are tremendous. A man who hits as hard as he does must have abnormal development of wrist and forearm."

Notre Dame Coach Expects to Turn Out Team Equal to Eleven Before the War.

NOTRE DAME, IND., Sept. 12.—With at least twenty ex-service men who have played on former Notre Dame varsity teams sure to be on hand when practice begins September 15, Athletic Director Knute K. Rockne is looking forward to an eleven worthy of comparison with Notre Dame teams of pre-war days.

Those players who have sent word they will return to school this fall are Mohr and Bahm, quarter backs; Barry, Gipp, Fitzpatrick, Bergman, Pierson, Malone and Brandy, half backs; Miller, Slackford and Ryan, full backs; Hayes, Kink, Meagher and Anderson, ends; Coughlin and McGuire, tackles; H. Anderson, Smith and Kasper, guards; McInerney, All-Western tackle in 1916, and Murphy, a tackle on the same team, were killed in action in France.

Notre Dame makes her annual pilgrimage to West Point to meet the Army eleven on November 8. Indiana, Purdue, Nebraska and the Michigan Aggies are her principal opponents in the West. This year Notre Dame will play her sixth game with the Army.

His Dorias and Knute Rockne, managers, extraordinary of the forward pass in 1917, who furnished the principal part in Notre Dame's initial victory over the Army, are now joint-ly in complete charge of Notre Dame athletics. Knute Rockne, who, during his five-year stay at Notre Dame, coached three eleven which defeated the Army, has given up the game to become a Kansas ranch owner.
