## A Committee on Horticulture.

The appointment of a regular standing club committee on horticulture will be recommended to the Commercial club board of governors as a result of a meeting of the committee on manufactures and new industries at the club yesterday afternoon. It is argued that the horticultural industry in this state and vital matters that relate to it should receive the attention of the club, but that there is no standing committee at present that would have jurisdiction.
