WALL STREET SPECULATION IS ONCE MORE AT HIGH TIDE

Burst of Buying in the Last Hour Carries Quotations in Leading Stocks to New High Levels.

By BROADAN WALL.

By International News Service. NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—"Those who can read words of one syllable should understand that this is a bull market." Such was the crushing reply from a member of the exchange to the stereotyped greeting, "What do you think of integers?"

typed greeting, "What do you think of things?"

In the last hour prices boiled with a burst of buying that carried quotations to new high levels.

Advices from London indicating a sudden revival of speculative activity there were largely responsible for the sudden increase in strength, although there had been many indications that our market was bare of stocks and would advance easily on a renewal of buying.

New York was slow to grasp the wide importance of the drop in the French bank rate and the improvement in the English market.

Opening Prices Firm.

Room traders who had been playing for a reaction found difficulty in closing their short contracts. Opening prices were firm, with buying orders in Steel. Southern Pacific and Amaigamated for foreign account. Early gossip fore-shadowed an upturn during the day in Union Pacific, when from 1612 the stock broke through its previous barrier, 1622, and rose sharply to 1632. Interesting developments regarding the segregation plan are anticipated.

Investment buying was conspicuous. Great Northern preferred gained 2 points. St. Paul 22 and Canadian Pacific 52. Southern Pacific has again turned upward. The shares were in good demand at 982.

In spite of the large amount of misin spite of the large amount of mis-information regarding what the Reading directors were not going to do, the shares touched a new high point by selling at 176. This issue is a decided favorite with some of the best experienced traders on

the floor. Improvement in the Mexican situation brought a 5-point rally in Mexican Petroleum, largely at the expense of the shorts. Equipment stocks developed notable strength. Pressed Steel Car gained 31 and is now some 10 points above the figure ruling when dividend action was anticipated some ten days ago. Bethlehem Steel gained a point and Locomotive 14. Industrials generally were strong. Westinghouse gained 24 and American Tobacco 22.

Advance in Steel.

Steel probably, more truly than any other stock, reflected the extent of the short interest. On heavy declines the price advanced over 2 points. Steel com-mon is a decided favorite with the pub-

Steel common is a decided favorite with the public and if present confidence in the renewal of speculative activity is well founded a further rise may be looked for, for the public could easily absorb the floating supply which observers hold is abnormally small at this time.

Copper stocks were heavily purchased for foreign account, Amalgamated gaining 2 points, Utah 1 and Anaconda 8. It was a matter of comment in London that at the close of the fortnightly settlement the English market was practically without American stocks at the carry-over. This would indicate that a further buying movement will find its way to our market.

Bonds were active and strong, with ex-cellent buying in high-grade issues. New York City 42s touched a new high fig-ure. Wabash refunding 4s sold from 582 to 592 and a further rise is looked for. Union Pacific convertibles were strong and Rock Island issues showed a marked

strength.

Although the improvement in security prices here has been under way for the past month, the worldwide significance of the ease in money promises to give a fiven impulse, which may carry prices considerably higher. Sentiment in financial district is increasing. strength.

In provisions the outcome varied from a selback of 10c to 42 ic. Because of the weather map nothing seemed able to arouse enthusiasm today on the buying side of wheat. Even the overthrow of the free wheat bill in the Canadian parliament did not assist the market upward more than a trifle and apparently had no lasting influence. On the other hand, the absence of export demand was a constant incentive toward efforts to put prices on a lower level. Heavily enlarged offerings of hard winter wheat from west of the Missouri river were taken to indicate a decided change of sentiment on the part of many producers. One prominent concern here reported that more rural holdings had been disposed of over night than at any time in three months. Advices that for the first time in years flour was being shipped from this country to Brazil tended somewhat to check the decline.

Cheap offerings from Argentina, especially at Gaiveston, depressed the corn market. The Argentine surplus was estimated at 80,000,000 bushels more than a year ago. Shipping demand here seemed to have made a complete halt, the result of prospects for continued saving of feed because of the openness of the winter.

Trade in oats was only of a scattering sort and depended almost entirely on the action of the other cereals.

Aside from a flurry on the part of shorts in January pork, and some early strength due to an upturn in the hog market, provisions averaged lower. Longs were realizing on nearly all of the active deliveries.
