WILL SAVE KEY HOME

Memorial Association Starts Move to Buy Place.

THE OFFICERS ARE SELECTED

Residence of Author of "Star-Spangled Banner" Will Be Converted Into Place of National Interest if Present Plans Are Carried Out—Admiral Dewey Among Officials.

Initial steps for the preservation of the old Francis Scott Key mansion, in Georgetown, where the author of "The Star-Spangled Banner" lived at one time, were taken at a meeting last evening, at the University Club, when officers and trustees of the Francis Scott Key Memorial Association were elected and plans outlined for purchasing the property.

Papers for the incorporation of the association were filed January 17, by F. S. Key Smith, a great-grandson of the author of the national anthem.

Henry R. F. Macfarland, District Commissioner, president, and was elected president of the association. Admiral George Dewey was selected as first vice president, and Admiral Schley was made second vice president. William D. Hoover was chosen treasurer, and F. S. Key Smith was selected secretary.

By-laws were adopted, and it was decided to make the initiation fee of membership to the association \$1 a year.

John Morgan, through his attorneys, W. D. Sullivan and James A. Toomey, yesterday brought suit against Sarah G. Warwick and Edward E. 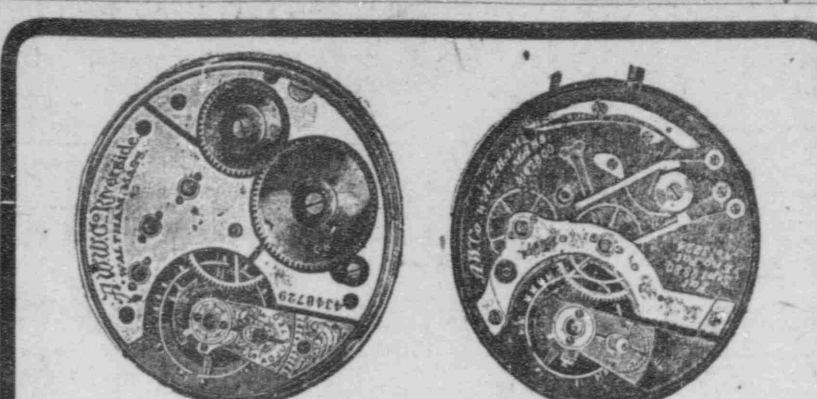

BULLETIN. BUSINESS CENTERS OF THE EAST.

While Washington looms large in the political affairs of the Nation, it is in the cities of Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, and Boston that the business life of the East centers.

To Baltimore a schedule of thirty-three trains every weekday via the Pennsylvania Railroad provides convenient service at frequent intervals.

To Philadelphia nineteen week-day trains provide high-grade service at timely hours. Pullman parlor or sleeping cars are attached to all trains but two; dining cars are on seven trains, and buffet service is furnished by parlor cars.

To New York eighteen through trains are run every weekday with parlor or sleeping cars; dining cars serve meals on seven trains, and buffet service is provided in all parlor cars.

To Boston the "Colonial Express" by day, and the "Federal Express" by night, both through trains, link the National Capital with the Metropolis of New England.

A liberal Sunday schedule is also maintained.
