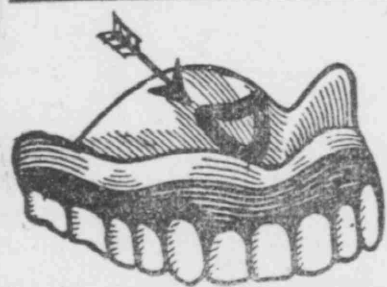

### BENEFIT FOR ORPHANAGE.

#### Catholic Knights of America Will Give Ball Thanksgiving.

Every boy in St. Joseph's Asylum will receive a special Thanksgiving treat through the kindness of the Catholic Knights of America, whose annual ball for the benefit of the asylum will be given on Thanksgiving evening in Convention Hall.

For twenty-six years the charitable Knights have undertaken this enterprise for the orphans, and have made the day not only bright for them, but also for Washingtonians who avail themselves of the opportunity.

St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, connected with the parish of St. Patrick's Church, is the special charge of the local Catholic Knights of America. A committee of the knights solicits subscriptions among the residents of the city, and gathers each year a large sum of money and supplies. A general invitation is extended to the public to send to the orphanage contributions of money, provisions, clothing, or other useful articles.

On the night of the entertainment the address of welcome will be given by Right Rev. Thomas J. Shahan, rector of the Catholic University of America. The boys of St. Joseph's will give an exhibition of calisthenic exercises, interspersed with patriotic songs. Music for the occasion will be furnished by an orchestra under the leadership of Prof. I. T. Feringer.

## NEWS OF ALEXANDRIA

### Conference Called Regarding Ferry for Workmen.

### ACCIDENT TIES UP RAILWAY

William C. Van Matre Brings Suit for \$10,000 Against Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railway—Episcopal High School Eleven Defeats Woodberry Forest.

Alexandria, Va., Nov. 13.—Arrangements have been made for a conference of the Alexandrians employed at the Washington Navy Yard and at the steel plant on the opposite side of the river and the transportation committee of the chamber of commerce will meet Tuesday, next, at the rooms of the chamber to see what arrangements can be made to place a ferry on the river for the benefit of the Alexandrians employed at these plants.

One hundred and ten Alexandrians are employed at both plants, and the withdrawal of the two households, which operates between this city, Washington, and the steel plant, December 1, will effect thirty-five Alexandrians employed at that plant.

The chamber of commerce has already held conferences with the owner of the steamer Edward S. Gamble, who will be present at Tuesday evening's meeting. It is generally believed that satisfactory arrangements will be made through the instrumentality of the chamber of commerce to have the steamer placed in operation before long. As the placing on the river of such a steamer would be of great benefit to the employees of both plants, it is regarded as almost certain that the majority of the employees of the plants will signify their willingness to use the steamers as a means of transportation to and from their work.

Communication between this city and Washington over the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railway was cut off for two and one-half hours this morning as a result, it is said, of a grounded wire somewhere between the power house at Four-mile Run and Alexandria. The first north-bound car to suffer as a result of the trouble was the 8 o'clock train out of this city, which was unable to depart until 10:35 o'clock. In the meantime all other trains were tied up. Hundreds of Alexandrians employed in Washington, together with others, were compelled to lose half a day's work, and many remained away for the day. Most of those who started on south-bound trains walked to this city.

Through his attorney, Samuel G. Brent, William C. Van Matre to-day brought suit in the Corporation Court to recover damages in the sum of \$10,000 from the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railway Company for personal injuries alleged to have been sustained in an accident on the defendant company's road while a passenger on September 8 last.

Amos Redmond, a negro, an inmate of the city almshouse, has been adjudged of unsound mind by a lunacy commission composed of Drs. Gorman, Wilkins, and Justice L. H. Thompson. He will be sent to an asylum at Petersburg, Va.

The Episcopal High School football team, in a well-played game on its own grounds this morning, defeated the strong Woodberry Forest team by a score of 28 to 6. Both teams afterward attended the Virginia-Georgetown game.

"Why a layman's missionary movement?" will be the subject of an address which will be delivered by Dr. W. B. Stubbs, general secretary of the Layman's Missionary Society, at the M. E. Church South at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Several hundred Alexandrians this afternoon journeyed over to Washington to witness the Virginia-Georgetown football game, and incidentally to root for Virginia.

"Who is responsible?" will be the subject of a morning address by Rev. W. F. Watson, pastor, at the First Baptist Church to-morrow. At the evening services he will take for his subject, "Good news from a far country."

At a meeting of the board of directors of the chamber of commerce, held this morning, T. Clinton Howard was elected a member.

### LAWYER SLAIN BY WIFE.

#### San Antonio Woman Declares She Shot in Self-Defense.

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 13.—Nat. B. Jones, a prominent San Antonio lawyer, died to-day as the result of bullet wounds received last night in his wife's apartments. It is understood Mrs. Jones has been arrested and is being guarded in her room.

Jones and his wife occupied separate apartments, owing to a recent estrangement. Jones was found lying on the floor with a razor near his hand. Mrs. Jones said she shot her husband in self-defense.

She says she attacked her with a razor. Black satin revolvers and cuffs are to remain in style.

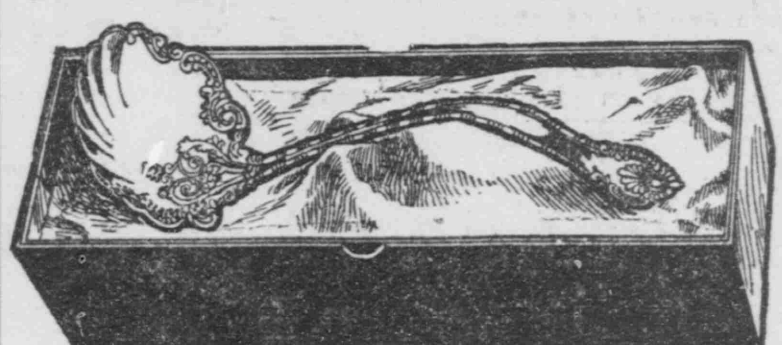

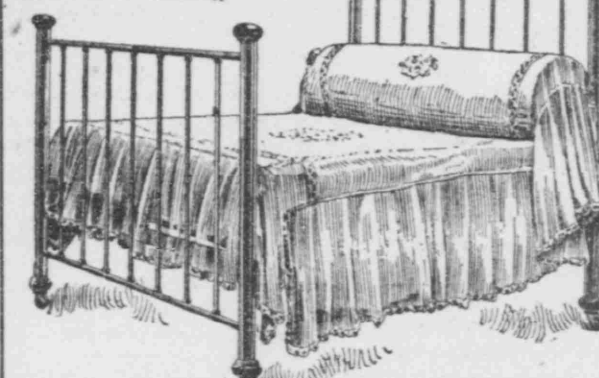

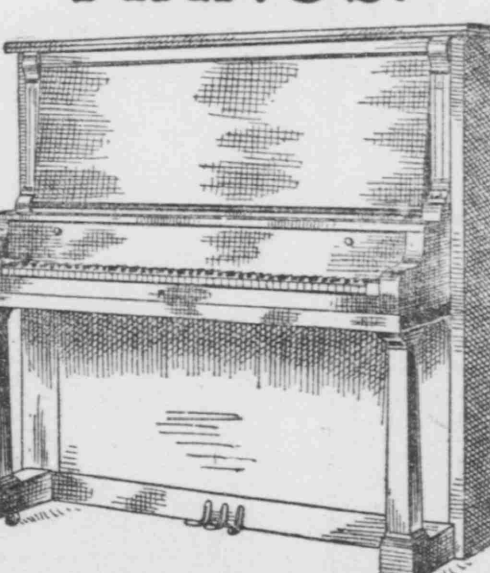
