CAPITAL HOST TO DELEGATES AT RECEPTION

Chambers of Commerce Representatives Entertained at Pan-American Building. EVENT IS QUITE BRILLIANT

Prominent Men of All Nations Guests of Washington Commercial Body.

In the beautiful marble home of the Pan-American Union, brilliantly lighted like a fairy palace, John Barrett, who is known to the world as the man who united the Latin-American nations of this continent, in connection with the Washington Chamber of Commerce, last night gave a reception to the delegates of the Fifth International Congress of the Chambers of Commerce and Industrial Associations.

The reception might well be called a review of the nations of the world, the sumptuousness of the far East, India, Arabia, and Turkey, the severe conservatism of the English and the Scandinavians, the brightness of sunny Italy, Austria, and Spain, all blended into making the occasion one of the most notable held in Washington in recent years.

The guests were received at the head of one of the splendid stairways by Director General John Barrett, of the Pan-American Union, assisted by Louis Cannon-Legrand, of Belgium, president of the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce.

The guests passed the receiving line into the handsome assembly hall of the building, where an orchestra was stationed, and many of the guests danced. It had been planned to hold the reception on the terraces to the west of the building, but the weather prevented.

Ten policemen were necessary to keep the entrance to the Pan-American Building clear at night. Hundreds of women, escorted by silk-hatted, frock-coated dignitaries, tried to gain admittance. In each case, unless they showed the proper credentials at the door, they were turned back.

The foreign delegates, 400 strong, yesterday afternoon made a pilgrimage to Mount Vernon and paid tribute to George Washington. A wreath was placed in the tomb by the foreign delegates. Mount Vernon was thrown open to the visitors, and under the guidance of Supt. Dodge they visited every nook and corner of the historic estate.
