DISLIKES THE USE OF WORD INSANE

Board of Visitors of Government Hospital for the Insane Recommends Change in Name.

MAKES ITS ANNUAL REPORT

The board of visitors of the Government Hospital for the Insane has submitted to the Secretary of the Interior the fifty-seventh annual report of the institution, covering the operations for the year ended June 30, 1912. The report is accompanied by tabular statements, reflecting in figures, incomes, supplies and details of the several departments. It is a full and complete review of the hospital for the last fiscal year.

With reference to the number of persons cared for in the institution the report says:

"On June 30, 1912, there were remaining in the hospital 2,598 patients, as against 2,582 remaining on June 30, 1911, an increase of 16 over the previous year. There were admitted during the year 732 patients, an increase of 139 over the previous year. The total number of patients treated during the year was 3,330, an increase of 54 over the previous year. The number of discharges during the year, including deaths, was 697, an increase of 20 over the previous year. The daily average population was 2,575.5, as against 2,564 for the previous year, a decrease of 11.5.

"When we note that the number of admissions for the year amounts to 732, having been received only upon two previous occasions, namely, in 1902-3, when the admissions were only 704, and in 1903-4, when there were 764, the years following closely upon the Spanish-American war and the occupation of the Philippines, it will be seen that a considerably more rapid increase in the population of the hospital is to be expected from now on."

Sanitary Conditions.

Sanitary conditions are set forth as follows:

"The general health of the institution has been good on the whole. Two cases of typhoid fever developed among the employees of the hospital during the year, both traceable to outside sources. One, who was a hemophiliac, died. Two cases of pellagra were admitted. One died and the other case cleared up. There has been considerable access of malaria in the institution recently owing to the fillet in of the Anacostia River flats. An effort has been made to guard against this as far as possible by local attention to the grounds and by screening of the windows and doors.

"Continuous effort has been made to improve the clinical records of the hospital, and they have been placed definitely in charge of one of the members of the staff, so that this effort may be consistently applied. Practically all of the cases that have been presented at staff conferences since April 1, 1908, and discharged have been catalogued, as well as the deaths which have been presented for diagnosis."

The report concludes with a long recital of the needs of the institution, among which is the proposed change in the name, which will eliminate the word insane. The special needs referred to are new laws governing the commitments to the institution, the advisability of continuing the care of patients sent there from the army and navy, and the purchase and improvement of additional lands to provide for the immediate and future growth of the hospital.

The report is submitted over the signatures of George M. Sternberg, chairman of the board of visitors, and William A. White, M. D., superintendent and secretary of the board.

WOMAN PAINTS IN COURT WHEN CONTESTED WILL CASE IS DECIDED IN HER FAVOR

When a jury in Justice Gould's court yesterday returned a verdict declaring that Mrs. Ella Barnhart is entitled to the entire estate of John C. Mothershead, valued at \$18,000 she fainted from joyful surprise. She recovered in a short time, restoratives being applied.

The verdict sustaining the will of Mr. Mothershead, whose relatives had questioned his sanity, came as the culmination of the trial lasting since Monday, Mr. Mothershead lost his wife two years before his death and had no children. Mrs. Barnhart lived next door to him, occupying a house owned by Mr. Mothershead, and at his request took care of his household affairs until his death.

Petition of Involuntary Bankruptcy Filed Against Auto Supply House.

Wilton J. Lambert and Lucas P. Loving yesterday were appointed by Justice Barnard as receivers for the F. K. B. Company, an automobile accessories house at 1110 and 1112 Fourteenth Street Northwest.

The bond of the receivers was fixed at \$10,000. The court's action is based on a petition in involuntary bankruptcy filed by creditors of the concern, claiming the corporation to be indebted to the extent of \$12,000. The value of the assets is placed at \$7,000.

Suit in Involuntary Bankruptcy Filed Against Charles A. Hanson.

Hanson, the transfer being made by way of chattel deed of trust to Edwin C. Dutton and George A. Maddox, trustees, to secure to William A. Hanson the sum of \$2,300.
