CARS COLLIDE; THREE INJURED

Alleged Failure of Air Brakes Hurts Two Men and One Woman.

Prospective damage suits kept piling up against the Washington Railway and Electric Company, due to faulty brakes, it is said. Less than twenty-four hours after the killing of Capt. Richard W. Parfet, U. S. M. C., the death of his son, and serious injury of his wife, due to failure of the brakes on a car of the Washington Railway and Electric Company to work, at the accident, fortunately less serious, occurred yesterday when a car of the same company collided with a car of the Capital Traction Company, which was standing at North Capitol street and Massachusetts avenue northwest, injuring two men and one woman.

Miss Anna Cooper, of 316 A street, northwest, was hurt on the back of the head, D. F. Marberry, fifty years old, of 208 First street, southeast, suffered severe bruises on the shoulders and head, while Ruben Hammond, colored, twenty years old, of 616 Third street, northeast, was cut on the head and hand. All three were removed to Emergency Hospital where their injuries were treated.

At the inquest held yesterday at the District Morgue, Mortuary Arthur G. Carter, twenty years old, of 3030 Reservoir avenue, northwest, and Conductor Ralph Leroy Whalen, nineteen, of 1629 Wisconsin avenue, northwest, were held by the coroner's jury for the action of the grand jury in the deaths of Captain Parfet, and his son, Richard W. Jr.

Testimony adduced at the inquest showed that both the air and hand brakes on the car which struck Captain Parfet's Ford automobile, failed to work, Carter admitting he saw the motor car in time to avoid a collision.
