The importance of low resistance in the aerial is obvious when it is considered that the flow of current In any system is inversely propor-tional to the resistance of that circuit when the voltage is constant. This means, the less resistance there is in the receiving aerial, the more current will flow into it and through the set. You cannot expect a large output from the telephones when a high resistance in the aerial circuit impedes the flow of current in the fuput side.

Be sure that your ground connec-

tion is as perfect as possible. Solder it to a water pipe rather than to other pipes in the house. Keep the lead-in away from grounded metal-lic substances. If possible, stretch your aerial over a vacant lot rather than off top of buildings. An ideal aerial is one 125 feet long and fifty feet high with lead-in coming in at
