The Art of Rat Catching.

[New York Correspondence Troy Times.]

Those who pass through Spring street may notice the advertisement of Thomas Fullerton, the famous rat-catcher, who has been very successful in this specialty. Mr. Fullerton is a man of thirty-five, and has practiced rat catching seven years. He was five years in Liverpool and has been two years in this city. He took up the business from an instinctive perception that nature had designed him for its performance. As he never shrinks from duty he obeyed the promptings of destiny and thus has become what he is. Mr. Fullerton is very ready to converse on the subject of whose imhas become what he is. Mr. Fullerton is very ready to converse on the subject of whose importance he has long had a powerful conception. He has but one rival in the city, Richard Toner, better known as "Dick the Ratter." The business is always performed at night, and Mr. Fullerton averages four nights in a week. The places most infested with rats are hotels, restaurants and slaughter houses. From one of the former he took 164, while in one of the latter the catch was 216. The task requires much patience, and three nights are generally devoted to one place. He took from one hotel 100 the first night, 200 the second night, and afteen the third. For this important service his terms are \$10 per house, but hotels are required to pay a larger fee. There is some risk in the business, and Mr. Fullerton has been occasionally bitten severely, but he now knows how to handle a rat and Mr. Fullerton has been occasionally bitten severely, but he now knows how to handle a rat with safety. Mr. Fullerton says that "rat catching" as a trade cannot be taught. In other words (as Horace says of the poet), the rat catcher must be born to his vocation. Those who have the grand instincts which impel them to the work alone will succeed. His rival (Dick the Ratter) is hardly inspired to the full dignity of the work, but Mr. Fullerton feels no lack on this important point. He has taken 15,000 rats in one year. Who then can doubt his genfus? If any one be curious to learn what is done with these animals, the reply may be given that they are worth \$10 per hundred at the rat pits. Mr. Fullerton has constant orders from these establishments, one of which killed 2,000 in a week. The fox terrier and the bull terrier are both used for this purpose, but the former is week. One rat-batter owns a fox terrier which kills 100 rats in eight minutes, and this animal could not be bought for \$100. Should Bergh break up the rat-pits, which is now highly probable, it would seriously impair the profits of the trade. Mr. Fullerton thinks that rats know too much to be killed with poison as it is ordinarily administered. Speaking of rata. it is ordinarily administered. These animals, however, were well known to the ancient world, and the latter was an important feature in the religion of Ferrnt.
