The following is the bill pending before both Houses of Congress to increase the water supply of the District. It was introduced in the Senate by Mr. Ingalls and in the House by Mr. Barr: That the main conduit of the Washington aqueduct be extended from its present terminus to a point near Boundary, 10th street, and New Jersey avenue northwest, and connected by proper mains with the present system of distributing pipes, the conduit in its extension to have the same capacity and to be of the same general character as the portion of the same heretofore completed and now in use. The work shall be done under the direction of the Secretary of War, who is authorized and directed to prepare plans of its details and to commence and prosecute the same to completion with as much dispatch as is consistent with economy.

Sec. 2. That whenever it shall be found necessary for and construction to acquire the title to any lands not owned by the United States, the Secretary is authorized to proceed in acquiring the same under and according to the provisions of an act emitted "An act to acquire hands needed for the Washington aqueduct in the Distract of Columbia," approved April 8, 1888, which act is hereny revived and made effective for that purpose.

Sec. 3. That the sum of \$500,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, of any moneys in the Treasury Too otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the first and second sections of this act.

That the Metropolitan police of the Dis-trict of Columbia are hereoy deciared to be, and made, water-inspectors, in addition to the other regularly-appointed water-inspectors; and it shail be their duty, and they are hereby required, from time to time, unaier direction of the Com-missioners, to examine and inspect all premises where Potomac water is taken or used; and if at any time they shall find water inverse. any time they shall find water running to waste on any premises they shall forthwith report the number and locality of the premises, the name of the owner or occupant, and the character of the waste to the Commissioners of the District of Columbia

waste to the Commissioners of the District of Columbia.

Sec. 5. That upon receipt of such report, or of any other satisfactory evidence that water is running to waste on any premises, it shall be the duty of the Commissioners to cause the water-registrar forthwith to notify the owner or occumult of said premises, and it such waste is not pant of said premises, and it such waste is not stopped within forty-eight hours after such notice the water shall be cut off.

Sec. 6. That whenever the water supply shall be cut off under the provisions of the foregoing section it shall not be turned on again until the owner or occupant of such premises has paid to the water-registrar the sum of two dollars.
