A MAMMAL TAXIDERMIST.

Examination to Be Held for Benefit of the National Museum.

The civil service commission is preparing plans and specifications for an examination of a man, or any number of men, who can stuff rats, mice or chipmunks. They are to be stuffed and mounted, and the person who is being examined must do the stuffing tions that proclaim superior ability. In three working days of eight hours each, in the presence of an examiner. The call Owen Owen, Tailor. 423 11th. for the rat stuffer has not yet been sent out, but it will be prepared within the next two or three days, and will then be scattered broadcast all over the country. He is required by the terms of the examination to supply his own tools and mounts for the stuffed animals and a box to ship them to the civil service commission, but the commission will furnish the animals. Already the flat has gone forth, and the official rat, nouse and chipmunk catchers are scouring the country and the city to obtain the

Commissioners Green and Procter are interested in the quest, and it is rumored that as fine a collection of dead rodents is being made for the commission, under the personal direction of the commissioners mentioned, as will be found anywhere in

The cause of this scientific research is a request from the National Museum for the eligible list of mammal taxidermists—a taxidermist who can stuff a rat or a mouse or a chipmunk. It is believed to require expert care and knowledge to properly stuff one of these little animals, and as none one of these little animals, and as none of the experienced hands at the commission desired to desert their present posts it was necessary to issue a call to the country at large, so that a patriotic rat stuffer might be found to take the job. Weather conditions and general forecast— The movements of areas of high and low barometric pressure over the United States during the last two days have been exceptionally rapid. Since Wednesday morning a storm has advanced from the north Pacific coast to lowa, and a rain area has swept from the lake region and central val-leys eastward over the Atlantic coast states, The passage of the north Pacific storm has been followed by rain in the middle and north Pacific coast districts, and by snow n the middle and northern Rocky mountain egion.

The eastward movement of the depression that covered the Mississippi valley and western lake region Wednesday morning has been followed by a decided fall in temperature from the western lake region over the Onio and Mississippi valleys. In the Atlantic coast states and from the Mississippi river to the Rocky mountains the temperature has risen. Over the extreme northern Rocky mountain districts, the British Northwest territory and the north Pacific coast the temperature is be-low the seasonal average, with a minimum reported reading of 2 degrees above zero at Battleford and 8 degrees above at Ed-

Rapid changes in weather and temperature will continue over the eastern and northeastern parts of the United States during the next two days. In the Atlantic coast districts cooler and fair weather will be followed Friday by increasing cloudiness and rain. In the Ohio valley and lower lake region the temperature will rise to-night, with increasing cloudiness and rain or snow Friday. In the southern states the weather will continue fair with rising temperature Friday.
On the middle Atlantic coast the winds

will be fresh westerly, shifting to southerly; on the south Atlantic coast light and variable, shifting to fresh easterly; on the east gulf coast light to fresh southerly, and on the lower lakes increasing and high south-Storm warnings are displayed on the upper lakes, except Duluth, and on Lake Erie, except at Buffalo and Cleveland.

A Question Before the House Com-

mittee on the Library. The committee on the library of the House of Representatives may be called upon to decide as to just who was the father or founder of the American navy. Tuesday Representative Currier of New Hampshire introduced a bill in the House providing an appropriation for the erection of a statue in this city of John Paul Jones, who was referred to in the text of the measure as "the founder of the American navy." The bill was referred to the committee on the library.

Yesterday a bill was introduced in the House by Representative Driscoll of New York, appropriating \$50,000 for the erection in this city of a monument to the memory of Commodore John Barry, upon which shall be inscribed the words: "Erected to the memory of John Barry, father of the American navy."
Following the course of the John Paul Jones bill this measure was also referred to the committee on the library. Much interest is being manifested in the probable action of the committee. Some claim that the terms "founder" and "father" are in-compatible, while others declare them to be synonymous.

Withdraws Plea of Not Guilty. James Henson, indicted for robbery, today in Criminal Court No. 1 withdrew his plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty. The offense charged was the snatching of a pocket book from Maggie Harrison. Justice Pritchard sentenced the defendant to imprisonment in the New Jersey state prison at Trenton for five years. Henson is also under indictment for Henson is also under indictment for murder in the first degree, in connection with the death of Lazler Gozman. He has been in jail since January 7 last. It is understood that he will go to the penitentiary on the robbery charge, and in the event of additional evidence being obtained may be called to account later to answer the indictment for murder.
