McKinley Returns to Roosevelt

Director McKinley of the Taft bureau has issued this statement: In his speech at Salisbury, Md., Col. Roosevelt paraphrased asked every colored man in this state to see to it that no colored man sells his vote in the primaries, and declared that "unscrupulous white men are willing to debauch the colored man, taking advantage of his needs, and that the colored man who sells his vote is doing immeasurable harm to his own race."

FINED FOR POLITICAL WORK

F. H. Lathrop and J. G. Bass of Alabama Are Punished for Activities. Announcement is made by the United States civil service commission that F. H. Lathrop, campaign manager in 1910 for J. O. Thompson, collector of internal revenue, Birmingham, Ala., who at that time was republican nominee for governor of Alabama, has been sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 for violating section 119 of the criminal code of the United States, which prohibits any person from soliciting or receiving political contributions in buildings used for federal purposes.

NO GOLD FOUND IN BOLIVIA

Report of Discovery Said to Have Been False. The State Department is in receipt of a telegram from La Paz, Bolivia, regarding the discovery of gold in that country. According to this telegram, a great many Americans are arriving in that country to seek gold, having been misled by false reports circulated in a letter signed by a man called Ferguson.

GIVES RIGHT TO LAY GAS MAIN

Senator Overman has introduced a bill giving the Georgetown Gaslight Company authority to lay a gas main along Conduit road, from the end of the present main at Fox Hall and Conduit roads, to the District line. The construction is to be under the supervision of the War Department, which has jurisdiction over the Conduit road. The bill went to the Senate District committee.
