PLANS ALL-YEAR PARK.

Bill Provides for Site Within Indian Reservation.

A bill providing for the establishment of a 2.000-acre "all-year national park" in the Mescalero Indian reservation, N. M., was passed yesterday by the Senate. Under the measure the Secretary of the Interior would be instructed to select the park acreage from lands within the reservation and to provide proper houses for the Indian residents.

Cost of acquiring necessary properties and construction of houses would be paid out of funds from the sale of timber on the reservation. In explaining other provisions of the bill, Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico, said no federal appropriations would be necessary, and the purpose was merely to provide a national park, where people in nearby states might go for recreation.
