### SENATOR ORIGINAL CHOICE FOR CABINET PORTFOLIO

Postmaster General Has Been Steady Contender for Interior Post.

President Harding today sent to the Senate the nominations of Postmaster General Hubert Work, to be Secretary of the Interior; Senator Harry S. New of Indiana, to be Postmaster General, and Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, to be director of the Veterens' Bureau. Senator New's nomination was con-

firmed immediately by the Senate in open session, following precedents of courtesy to sitting members.

Postmaster General Work of Colo-

Postmaster General Work of Colorado was the first to fill a vacancy in President Harding's cabinet, when he was appointed Postmaster General to succeed Will H. Hays.

Senator New of Indiana, who will retire from the Senate March 4, and named to be Postmaster General, succeeding Dr. Work, has been in public life in Washington for years. He was defeated in the Indiana primaries by Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana, who won the nomination for senator, but was defeated in the election by Gov. Samuel L. Ralston.

Gen. Hines, who becomes director of the Veterans' Bureau, effective tomortow, was chief of transportation for the Quartermaster Corps during the world war. Gen. Hines entered the Army in the National Guard from Utah and at the beginning of the world war was a captain, climbing through the ranks obrigadier general. He is forty-four

to brigadier general. He is forty-four years of age.

Senator New had been offered a place in the original Harding cabinet, but declined because he thought he could render the administration a greater service by remaining in the Senate. In last year's primaries he was defeated for renomination, however, and when it became known that he was under consideration for the cabinet an element of the Indiana republican organization began a determined but losing fight to prevent the appointment.

The selection of Dr. Work to take the Interior portfolio has been forecast ever since President Harding began to turn over in his mind the names of available candidates. A resident of Colorado and a man of demonstrated ability in governmental organization, Dr. Work is regarded by the President as fulfilling all the qualifications for an Interior Secretary.

New Long in Public Life. Senator New has been in public life for nearly twenty-five years and is a former newspaper man. He is serving his first term in the United States Senate, to which he was elected in 1916.

The \$240 bonus bill, carrying a to al of \$35,799,753, was reported to the House today by Chairman Madden of he appropriations committee. The es imates for the legislative branch of he government, the executive office, he ten executive departments, the udiciary, thirteen independent execu-ive agencies and the municipal govrnment of the District, totaled 38,421,993, so that the bill as reported is \$2,622,240 less than the amount requested and \$2,935,420 less than the ount appropriated for the current

The amount recommended in the hill as payable as follows: Wholly from the general Treasury, \$33,667,428; from the postal revenues, \$373.248; 60 per cent from the revenues of the District of Columbia and 40 per cent from the Treasury, \$1,795,067.

Congress, commencing with the fiscal year 1918, has provided additional temporary compensation at varying rates to civilian employes in the lower pay grades by provision in annual appropriation bills up to and including the fiscal year 1922. For the fiscal year 1923, the additional compensation was provided in a single measure covering all serva single measure covering all serv-ices and a specific appropriation mad-for each department in lieu of the indefinite appropriations that had theretofore been made in the annual appropriation bills.

More Sabotage Reported. **Germans Cut Rhine Cable** of 125 Wires.
