Addition to Western High To Be in Rear, Board Rules

Daniel J. Callahan Unanimously Chosen to Head Body Ensuing Year, With Ernest Greenwood Vice President.

The animated discussion over the location of the addition to Western High School was ended when the board of education, at its reorganization meeting yesterday afternoon, recommended that the annex be erected in the rear of the present building. The action marked a victory for the citizens of Georgetown, who have steadfastly opposed the plan of the Engineer Commissioner's office to place the addition in front of the school.

A motion to approve the plan calling for the construction of the addition in rear of Western was made by James T. Lloyd, who pointed out that the board had considered the evidence submitted by architects and parties interested in the discussion carefully enough to make a decision. It was seconded by Ernest Greenwood, who a few minutes before had taken the oath as a member of the school board.

Continued Co-operation Asked. Daniel J. Callahan was unanimously elected president of the board for the ensuing year. Mr. Greenwood was chosen vice president after James T. Lloyd and Mrs. Howard L. Hodgkins had refused the office. Mr. Lloyd was elected vice president under his protest, and immediately resigned. Mr. Hodgkins withdrew his nomination in favor of Mr. Greenwood.

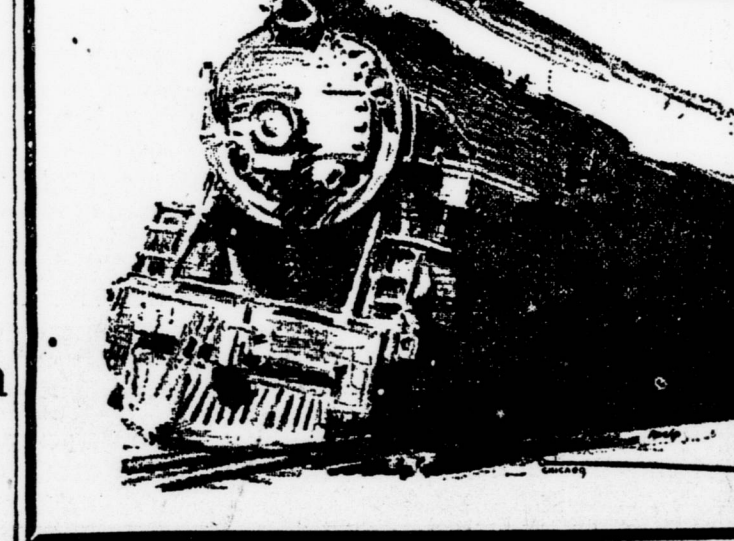

Curtis Considers Asking Tax on Road Billboards

A new source of revenue probably will be proposed at the next session of Congress by Senator Curtis of Kansas, republican whip of the Senate. While he has not perfected details, he has given much thought to the subject. He has decided to urge a tax upon them, based upon the square foot of space in each. In the opinion of Senator Curtis such a tax would prove a fruitful source of income, without imposing a burden upon the public at large. It is not his intention to suggest a tax upon signs exposed by dealers upon their own property.

Greenwood Thanks Board

Mr. Greenwood thanked the board for the honor conferred on him in choosing him vice president and declared that he had but one thought in mind—that the children of the District shall have educational facilities second to none in the United States.

Replying to a resolution from the executive board of the District Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Association asking that the schools used for community gatherings be closed thirty days prior to their opening in the fall, Superintendent Frank W. Ballou declared that only four of the 150 buildings in the system were being used in the summer as community centers, and they would be closed in sufficient time to permit a thorough cleaning and renovation. The Commissioner informed the board that additional property amounting to 5,582 square feet, had been purchased for the Langley Junior High School at a cost of \$3,000.

MRS. M. E. PERRY DIES AT G. W. U. HOSPITAL

Funeral Services for Doctor's Wife Held at St. Matthew's Catholic Church. Mrs. Margaret E. Perry, wife of Dr. Arthur Reed Perry, formerly connected with the medical section of the department of Labor's investigation service, died yesterday at George Washington University Hospital. Funeral services were held at St. Matthew's Catholic Church this morning when requiem high mass was sung. The body will be shipped to Attleboro, Mass., tonight on the Federal Express, where interment will be made. Dr. Perry and his wife came to Washington ten years ago. Dr. Perry having accepted a position in the medical investigation section of the department of Labor. He had held that position several years ago on account of illness and for the past three years the family has resided at Southern Pines, N. C. Mr. and Mrs. Perry are natives of Attleboro, Mass. Dr. Perry has been a patient at the Catholic Hospital since July 1, but was able to accompany the body of his wife back to the old family home.

POSSE HUNTS FOR SLAYER AFTER LEAP FROM TRAIN

Edwin Rust at Large After Killing Sheriff to Escape. BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. BRECKENRIDGE, Minn., July 3.—Posse from Moorhead and Breckenridge in Minnesota and Fargo and Wahpeton, N. D., are searching for Edwin Rust, who shot and killed Sheriff Fulker of Aberdeen, S. D., on a Great Northern train near Wolverton, Minn., last night. Rust, said to be wanted in Aberdeen for burglary and robbery, and to have a criminal record in California, was being escorted by a posse from East Grand Forks, Minn., where he was arrested. Rust is alleged to have shot the sheriff with two guns and shot the officer, and then escaped by leaping through a window of the moving train.

Visual Education Classes to Be Started in D. C. Schools

Miss Annie Howard Employed to Give Courses Here.

Have Proved Value in Other Cities, Teachers Say.

Visual instruction in the District public schools, long planned by the officials, will become a reality as the result of the appointment by the board of education yesterday afternoon of Miss Annie Marie Howard as director of visual instruction activities in the community center department.

One of the features of Miss Howard's work will be programs on the various countries of the world in which colored stereopticon slides will be the basis and songs and dances in costumes of each country will be added. The slide talks will be given by the young people for their parents. Such programs have been successfully conducted at the Johnson-Powell community center the past spring by Mrs. E. H. Hunter, community secretary. Under Miss Howard's direction this work will be put in all of the centers. Miss Howard received her public school education in St. Marys, Ohio, and is a graduate of the Ohio Northern University, where she received a degree in Dramatic Art and a post-graduate.

RICHARD E. DEDRICK BOES OF EXPOSURE

Capital Resident, Lost on Fishing Trip, Succumbs in Adirondacks.

Special Dispatch to The Star. WATERTOWN, N. Y., July 3.—Richard Emerson Dredrick, seventy-seven years old, of Washington, D. C., died last night in Watkins, in the Adirondack mountains, as a result of exposure when he became lost for several days while on a trout-fishing trip. Mr. Dredrick was removed from the Vandear camp to the home of Otto Hamele, in the village of Watkins, where he died a short time later.

Funeral services will be held here today, followed by burial at Crescent, N. Y., near Albany. Rev. Mr. Anderson of Philadelphia, who has been spending a vacation in the mountains, will officiate. Mr. Dredrick, a son, who resides in Washington, left last night for Watkins.

Mr. Dredrick, who is accustomed to spend the summer in the Adirondacks, left here Thursday morning on his fishing expedition and wandered off by Dead Creek road. Until evening no concern was felt by John Vandear, with whom Mr. Dredrick was staying. When the Washington man failed to return to supper a search party was organized. The night was cold and rain came, causing great apprehension. A searching party failed to find him until the following morning.

A second search was started Friday. All day there was a biting wind and heavy rain. The search party, which Dredrick had wandered around in the storm, slipping over wet logs and crawling over rocks, was unable to find him until the following morning. He was found by Mr. Vandear, who was looking for him in a dense growth of timber and underbrush near Oxhead creek flow in an unconscious condition. His face was flat on the ground in a low boggy spot twenty rods from the virgin forest and about a mile from the railroad bridge and the river.
