

REFERENDUM FAVORS PSALMS OVER HYMNS

Vote of United Presbyterian Church, 659 to 625, But Complication Is Reported. By the Associated Press.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 3 .- Mem bers of the United Presbyterian Church in seventy presbyteries have voted to continue singing psalms only, according to figures published here in the United Presbyterian.

Those voting in favor of psalms numbered 659, while 625 voted to include hymns. Church leaders said the ballot was so complicated that probably the general assembly, to be held in Richmond, Ind., beginning May 28, would simplify the questions involved and order a new vote taken. Fifty-eight American presbyteries gave a slight majority for hymns, but this was offset by the heavy vote for psalms only in eleven foreign presbyteries. A large majority was given the revised article of faith, but the preamble, giving the new creed precedence over the Westminster confession and other creedal documents, was refected \$111.0500. bers of the United Presbyterian




