

WOMAN'S DEATH FOLLOWS SLAYING

Sister of Murdered Doctor's
Office Girl Is Believed
a Suicide.

SPOKANE, Wash., August 17.—Another death, an apparent suicide, today added tragedy to the mysterious shooting of Dr. J. I. Gaines, 41-year-old Spokane sportsman and druggist practitioner.

The body of Miss Pauline Pluym, 35, of Los Angeles, whose sister Cathleen was Dr. Gaines' office girl, was found in the home of her brother-in-law last night. The coroner said she had poisoned herself.

Police expressed belief publicity given her sister in connection with the investigation of the death of Dr. Gaines may have added to the despondency to which her relatives said she was subjected.

They said there was no apparent direct connection between the investigation and her death.

Meanwhile authorities held an attractive young woman, whose name they have not revealed, whom Dr. Gaines left scarcely 10 minutes before he was shot dead as he stepped from his automobile at his home early Tuesday morning.

She said he had been at her apartment for the preceding two hours, after spending Monday evening on a boating trip with her 17-year-old sister.

The older of the two young women said she moved into a fashionable apartment where Gaines visited her "five or six times a week" shortly after she met him three weeks ago and applied for work.

Although Detective Capt. James McCarty said he was convinced neither she nor her sister had any connection with the case, police held her as a material witness "until we make some progress" in the investigation.

Miss Pauline Pluym arrived in Spokane from Los Angeles Sunday, the same day her sister left for a visit to Tacoma.

CANDLER'S WIDOW SUES FOR \$250,000

Heirs and Executor Named in
Action to Obtain Additional
Sum Under Will.

DECATUR, Ga., August 17.—Mrs. May Little Candler, widow of Asa G. Candler, sr., has brought suit against the heirs and executor of the late Coca Cola millionaire for an additional \$250,000 she alleges was bequeathed her in his will and for a one-fifth share of the residuary estate.

The suit was brought against Charles Howard Candler, William Candler, Asa G. Candler, jr., Walter T. Candler and Mrs. Lucy Candler Heinz, other heirs, and against the Citizens & Southern National Bank, executor of the estate.

Mrs. Candler alleged in her petition that in item No. 4 of Mr. Candler's will, a bequest was made in her favor in the amount of \$250,000 and that in paragraph No. 2 of the codicil she was given an additional \$250,000 in lieu of the residue of the estate as provided in item No. 5 of the will.

The complaint set out that there being nothing in the codicil in conflict

with her bequest of \$250,000 in item No. 4 of the will, she is entitled to \$250,000 under that item and to an additional \$250,000 under the terms of the codicil.

Mrs. Candler said she was informed the other heirs have placed a different interpretation on the provisions of the will and codicil and contend she is entitled only to one bequest of \$250,000, the approximate amount she has already received from the estate.

LIQUIDATION ORDERED

Court Holds Efforts to Rehabilitate
Insurance Companies Futile.

NEW YORK, August 17 (AP)—Liquidation of the Lloyds Insurance Co. of America and the General Indemnity Insurance Co. of America was ordered yesterday by Supreme Court Justice Aron Sauer, who held further efforts to rehabilitate the companies would be futile.

George S. Van Schaick, State superintendent of insurance, who will direct the liquidation, took the companies over for rehabilitation August 4. Four days later the superintendent was ordered to cancel the policy obligations of the companies.

GRAY HAIR MAN SAYS HE IS CHARLEY ROSS

Fred Hendrickson to Make No Effort
to Claim Share in
Family Fortune.

LOS ANGELES, August 17.—Convinced he is Charley Ross, who was kidnapped when 5 years old from the home of his millionaire father in Philadelphia, Fred Hendrickson, now a gray-haired man of 65, said yesterday he would ask permission through the courts for legal use of the name to which he lays claim.

An action to restore the name of Charley Ross will be brought by Hendrickson's attorney, G. R. Lessing, who said no effort would be made to claim a share of the Ross family fortune.

Charley Ross was kidnapped from the family estate in Germantown, Pa., in 1874. No trace was ever found of him and nearly 60 different men have claimed to be the missing heir.

Hendrickson, as he has been called through a wandering life which finally brought him to Los Angeles, claimed

he was taken to Germany, where he was treated cruelly; ran away to sea and wandered widely, always in the shadow of pursuers, who prevented him making contact with his family.

Sweden's Trade Improves.

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Sweden's foreign trade for the first half of 1932 showed an improvement of \$16,500,000 in comparison with the same period last year. The export increase was especially prominent in wood pulp, timber and pig iron.

RESENTING "BACK TALK," CORPORAL KILLS PRIVATE

Non-Com at Fort Slocum Then
Shoots Self and Is Ex-
pected to Die.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., August 17.—Army officials announced yesterday that Pvt. Donald J. Zinn of York, Pa., was shot and killed at Fort Slocum by a

corporal who resented "back talk." The corporal, Truman E. Smith of Lima, Ohio, also shot himself and physicians said he could not live.

Col. Frederick Griffiths, commanding officer, pronounced the case murder and attempted suicide. Officers quoted Smith as saying, while he lay on an operating table: "I hope Zinn died. He called me an unspeakable name."

Col. Griffiths said Smith reprimanded Zinn for the way in which he had performed a small task. Smith was taken to a hospital, but physicians said an operation would be futile. He has been in the Army 25 years.

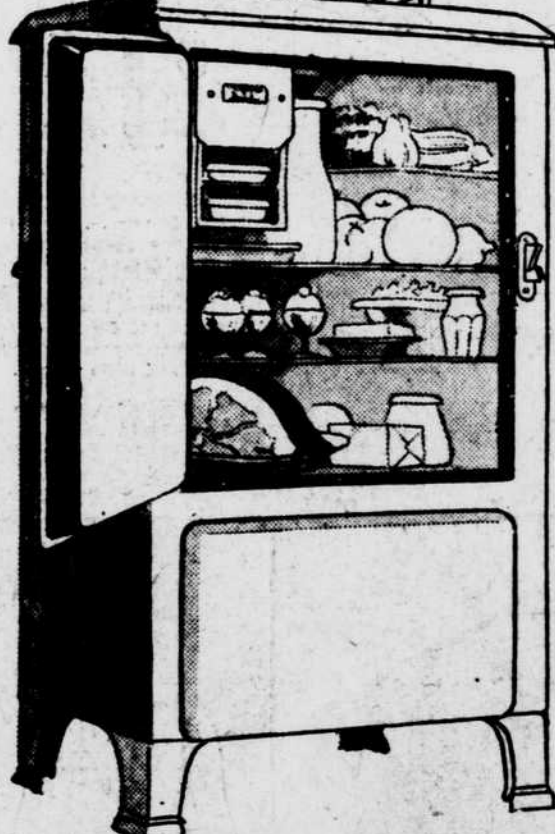
