



Funeral services for Henry Kirke

The 77-year-old sculptor had been ill about two weeks with a throat ailment and heart disease. A nephew and pupil of H. Kirke Brown, a foremost American sculptor, who was largely responsible for the establishment of the Fine Arts Commission, Mr. Bush-Brown was a former president of the Arts Club of Washington and had resided here for more then 20 years.

#### Gets Official Recognition.

Only Thursday one of Mr. Bush-Brown's best known works, "Indian Buffalo Hunt," executed in 1893, for the Chicago Exposition, was given official recognition by the House Library Committee, which recommended passage of a bill authorizing its casting in bronze as a permanent memorial to be erected in Potomac Park.

Born in Ogdensburg, N. Y., April 21 1857, the son of Robert W. and Caroline (Udall) Bush-Brown, the sculptor was educated at Siglar's School Newburgh, N. Y., and studied art at the National Academy of Design. He studied in Paris and Italy from 1886
