BARKLEY ENTERS **RE-ELECTION FIGHT**

Kentucky Senator Announces Candidacy With Indorsement of President.

By the Associated Press.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 24.—Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to the United States Senate.

His announcement yesterday followed a huge testimonial dinner given in his honor Saturday during which Marvin H. McIntyre, secretary to President Roosevelt, read a letter from the President praising Barkley's service as a Representative and Senator the last 25 years.

The announcement issued for Barkley described the Roosevelt letter as "in effect, * * * a vigorous indorsement of Senator Barkley."

Although there has been no formal announcement to that effect, it is believed generally that Gov. A. B. Chandler will be the senior Senator's opponent in the Democratic primary in August.

Text of Letter. The Roosevelt letter, addressed to McIntyre under date of January 21,

"My Dear Mac: "I understand that friends of Alben Barkley are giving a dinner in his honor in Louisville tomorrow night and since you are also a Kentuckian I wish you would go down to Louisville and tell the home folks how much we in Washington think of their senior Senator.
