

### Ambitious Campaign Lined Up for Kayak On Eastern Strips

#### Santa Anita Sensation Already Named for Four Big Races

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—Kayak II's brilliant victory in the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap prefaced today an Eastern campaign by the 4-year-old Argentine runner that may make new turf history.

Charles S. Howard, who bought Kayak at the bargain price of \$7,600 from his son, Lin, and Bing Crosby two years ago already has named him for the Metropolitan Handicap and Suburban at Belmont, the Dixie Handicap at Pimlico and the \$50,000 Massachusetts Handicap at Boston next summer.

The main division of the Howard stable will be shipped East some time after the Santa Anita meeting closes with the \$25,000 San Juan Capistrano Handicap Saturday and a charity-dedicated program Monday.

**Seabiscuit Stays on Coast.**

But the lame Seabiscuit, still Howard's pride and joy, will stay in Southern California to be pointed for the \$50,000 Gold Cup Handicap at Hollywood Park in the summer. His owner hopes he will better Sun Beau's money-winning record, of which he is \$36,000 shy.

It was lucky lightning striking twice in the same place that Howard, robbed of Seabiscuit for Santa Anita's "hundred grand," should have bobbed up with Kayak.

The 1 1/4-mile classic Saturday, run off before a record throng of more than 65,000 in the record-smashing time of 2:01 1/2, caused horsemen to marvel at the sturdy brown colt from South America.

**Star Steeds Without Allibs.**

There could be no excuses from the other 15 contenders in the handicap. Maj. Austin C. Taylor's Whickee turned in perhaps its greatest performance in finishing second to Kayak; Louis B. Mayer's surprising Main Man did the same thing for third. A. A. Baroni's Specify fulfilled the fears of some of his backers by burning up the track in a pace-setting duel with Whickee and had little left for the final charge to the wire.

Cravat, Today, Gosum, Jacola, Thanksgiving, Sortado, Congressman and the rest had no allibs; there was just too much horse in front of them. Stagehand's track mark, set a year ago in the cap, was lowered a fifth of a second by Kayak, who did it the hard way, starting from post position No. 16 and running on the outside the entire distance, passing Whickee in the stretch.

After a check of several minutes, which left the field reduced by 10 more riders, the pack broke into full cry and "gone away" again was heard. This time the trail was hot and the pace fast and furious. In fact, so fast that Mrs. James Bland, riding a big bay mare, took a heavy fall while going over a stiff post and rail. Also, Harry Smith's horse, Steel Dust, got cut up in wire.

**Chase Lasts an Hour.**

The fox, a big gray, began to circle, as they do, and after a chase of an hour or so he was brought to earth by the packs. The brush was given to Mrs. Robert Maddox, wife of the Middleburg huntsman.

The field slowly returned to the club and the rest, who had followed the other dogs, came in later with nothing but sweaty horses to show for their day's sport. Food and drink mellowed every one and the rest of the afternoon was spent in recounting the productive activities of the hunt.
