District representation in Congress was listed as an absolute requirement if the welfare problems facing Washington are to be handled effectively, the annual meeting of the Council of Social Agencies of the District and vicinity was advised yesterday by the council's executive secretary, Mrs. W. A. Rob-erts, in the United States Chamber of Commerce Building. Outlining the District welfare

problems, Mrs. Roberts declared the manpower shortage and insufficient funds were largely to blame for whatever shortcomings there were in the District welfare organizations. Discussing Gallinger Hospital, Mrs. Roberts pointed out that conditions there could have been remedied had there been adequate funds. Mrs. Roberts laid the blame for the Gallinger Hospital situation on the District Commissioners, the Budget Bureau and Congress, and said the problems had been pointed out to the council as far back as 1939, when an urgent request for more funds was made.

Commenting on the recent Senate committee investigation, Mrs. Roberts declared that "the findings of that committee seem to have been former employes who, for some reacommittee was completely ignored. This testimony was favorable."
