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British Diplomats of War Years Leaving Capital for New Posts

Many a familiar British face will have disappeared from the Washington scene by the time Lord Halifax, retiring British Ambassador, leaves for home early next month. Kept here by the pressure of their work during the war years, ranking British representatives now are due for transfer.

Harold B. Butler, minister in charge of empire public relations since June, 1942, left Washington last Friday for New York and is scheduled to sail for England Saturday. He headed what was perhaps the most intensive educational campaign ever to have been conducted by one nation on the soil of another.

With Mr. Butler goes his right-hand man, George Grant McKenzie, first secretary at the Embassy.

Already on his way to another assignment is Michael Wright, a counselor of Embassy, who flew to England Saturday on his way to Singapore. There he will take over a job as political adviser to Lord Killern, the newly designated British special commissioner for Southeast Asia. Washington was Mr. Wright's first diplomatic post. He came here in 1926 as third secretary, remaining five years at that time. He returned in 1943.

William O. Hart, youthful chief of the British Shipping Mission here, left for New York yesterday. He is scheduled for immediate return by boat to England, where he intends to resume his former occupation as professor of law at Oxford. Mr. Hart had been in Washington

since 1941 and had headed the mission for one year. He is to be succeeded by William Graham, due shortly in this country. The mission, from its wartime peak personnel strength of 75, has dwindled to an approximate 20.

One of Mr. Hart's chief assistants, Robert S. P. Edwards, is also preparing to leave this month. He has been in charge of tonnage allocations.

Among other personnel at the Embassy cleaning out their desks are Maj. J. G. Lockart, first secretary, and Capt. Leopold E. Rebbeck, assistant naval attaché. The latter will be replaced by Comdr. F. G. Bowring.

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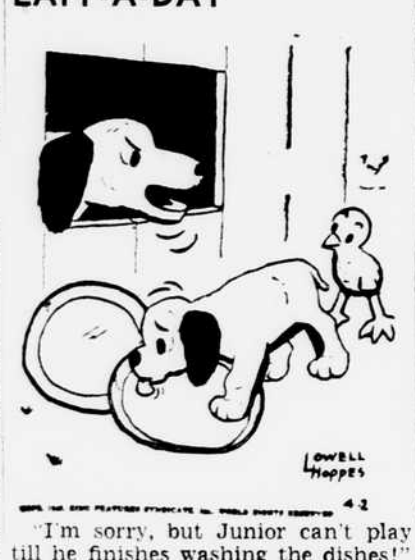
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Student Group to Report
