Decorated

Lt. Comdr. Matthew C. O'Hearn, Jr., U. S. N. R., 8 Quincy street, Chevy Chase, Md., this week was awarded the Navy Cross in recognition of extraordinary heroism as gunnery officer aboard the destroyer Evans during a savage Japanese suicide attack off Okinawa on May 11 last year, the Navy announced.

During the engagement, Comdr. O'Hearn controlled his guns "with such superb skill and inspiring courage" that they destroyed fifteen enemy planes and assisted in the destruction of four more. Afterwards, with light, power and water pressure lost, he assumed the duties of the critically wounded executive officer and "by his exceptional leadership" contributed greatly to the saving of his ship, the accompanying citation states.

1st Lt. Fearn Field, Field Artillery, whose parents, Capt. Richard S. Field, U. S. N., retired, and Mrs. Field, live in Rockville, recently was posthumously awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry for action in Germany during a sudden enemy counterattack on the night of March 6-7, 1945.

Lt. Field was assigned to establish a sound ranging base to locate enemy guns which were delaying the advance of attacking forces when the enemy thrust surrounded a vital outpost. He volunteered to join a small, lightly-armed rescue force to search for the trapped men, and when that force was ambushed he advanced single handedly against the enemy, "fighting courageously" until suffering fatal wounds, the citation states.

Col. Lloyd R. Moses, 4302 South Sixteenth street, Arlington, received the Legion of Merit on Monday for services as a staff officer of the plans section of headquarters of the Army Ground Forces here, from April, 1944, to April this year, the Army announced.

Capt. James B. Glennon, U. S. N., retired, 2601 Foxhall road N.W., recently received the Legion of Merit in recognition of services as officer in charge of the Naval Ordnance Laboratory at the Navy Yard, Washington, and later, as commanding officer, Naval Power Factory, from December, 1941, to October, 1945, the Navy announced today.

Capt. Joseph W. Sognier, Air Corps, 4550 Connecticut avenue N.W., recently was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service from June 15, 1945, to last January 5, as adjutant of the 14th Air Depot Group and Delta Air Depot, Ranaghat, India, and later, as adjutant of the Shanghai Air Depot, the Army announced in a dispatch from Shanghai.

Negro Veteran Meeting To Hear News Analyst

Ian Ross McFarlane, news analyst of Station WWDC, will speak at a mass meeting of the provisional committee to establish a District council and chapters of the United Negro and Allied Veterans, it was announced today by John O. Killens, chairman of the group. The meeting will be held May 31 in the Vermont Avenue Baptist Church.

Speakers from the national office of the CIO and from the national office of the new veterans' organization, will participate, Mr. Killens said. The United Negro and Allied Veterans is an inter-racial veterans organization which was formed in Chicago in April. Joe Louis, the boxer, is national honorary chairman.

Benning Citizens Oppose District Tax Increase

Opposition to an increase in any District taxes was voted by the Benning Citizens Association last night.

In making the motion opposing a tax increase, F. D. Wagner, delegate

to the Federation of Citizens Associations, pointed out that residents of Washington are now paying "their share" of taxes and asked that the Federal Government contribute more to District expenses.

On a motion by O. C. Spitzer, treasurer, the association adopted a resolution opposing additional liquor stores in the Benning area. A complaint was registered by sev-

eral citizens against trains letting off heavy black smoke in the area. Previously the association has gone on record protesting the nuisance.
