New Compromise Plan Is Rejected by Ford Plant Strikers

DETROIT, May 18.—One more compromise proposal lay in the waste basket today as Ford and the CIO United Auto Workers sought a settlement of a two-week-old strike.

Active Government intervention in the vexing production speed-up dispute still was only a possibility. More than 100,000 men are off the job.

Arthur C. Viat, regional director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, said he had not decided whether or when to step into the peace talks.

Some observers felt he would not take an active part as long as both sides kept making true proposals.

Called Fantastic.
The latest of a series of these was made yesterday by the company and turned down quickly by the UAW as "fantastic."

Ford suggested that the union call off its strike everywhere except in the "B" building of the big Rouge plant in neighboring Dearborn and the Lincoln-Mercury plant in Detroit.

John S. Bugas, Ford vice president and top company negotiator, said this would send 97,000 of the 102,000 idle Ford workers back to their jobs within a few days.

The other 5,000 are employed in the "B" building and the Lincoln-Mercury plant. These are the only places where the union has complained that Ford employees have been worked too hard.

But to strengthen its hand the union called out all 62,000 Rouge plant workers May 5, along with 3,000 from Lincoln-Mercury. Since then another 37,000 Ford employees throughout the country have been laid off because of a shortage of parts normally manufactured at the two struck plants.

Offers "Square Deal."
The Ford proposal, Mr. Bugas said, offered "a square deal to all parties directly or indirectly involved in this strike."

The UAW, however, thought differently.

Emil Mazey, UAW secretary-treasurer, called it "fantastic" and "merely a variation of the old employed trick of divide and rule."

Though only 5,000 workers are directly involved in "the immediate dispute," he said, all Ford employees are "directly affected by the basic principle of whether or not the company shall have the right to speed them up whenever it wants to."

Mr. Viat conferred with Mr. Mazey before yesterday's two-hour company-union talks. Later he talked with Mr. Bugas. He said he would remain in close touch with both parties and might take part in the negotiations later.

Forest Fire Hero's Iron Nerve 'Jumpy' at Award Presentation



President Truman yesterday added his congratulations to those received by Ranger James W. Simons for putting out a disastrous forest fire in Southern California with his bulldozer.

James W. Simons really needed his iron nerves around Washington yesterday.

A shy man at heart, he said the spotlight he faced was almost as trying at times as the glare of the forest fire he stopped with his bulldozer last November.

Another thing that puzzled the 34-year-old "cat" operator and California forest ranger was why even celebrities he met asked him for his autograph.

These latter included President Truman. It happened at the White House a few minutes after Agriculture Secretary Brannan had awarded Mr. Simons the American Forest Fire Medal for "outstanding heroism and devotion to duty."

The President shook hands with the visitor and congratulated him for his part in halting a particularly costly blaze in Topanga Woods during a dry spell in Southern California. Mr. Truman then offered to autograph the certificate that accompanied the medal for heroism.

Mr. Simons had no sooner thanked the President for his courtesies when Mr. Truman suggested they swap signatures. The ranger obliged in haste, scrawling his name on the back of a bit of literature urging the public to prevent forest fires.

The two parted after a five-minute chat on the subject of fire control.

The presentation at the Agriculture Department was a full-dress performance in the patio, accompanied by cameras, flashlights, microphones and military music. Mr. Simons was a bit jumpy, he admitted, but managed to come through like a veteran.

The ranger had been honored for volunteering to gouge out a trench with his bulldozer so near the advancing flames that his face and hair were scorched and his clothing partially burned away. He accomplished this feat over rough terrain, which threatened to roll his caterpillar tractor into the inferno.

Mr. Simons was credited with putting out a fire that already had consumed 123 homes and more than 3,000 acres of forest.

The ranger learned how to handle "cats" when he went ashore with the Seabees on the Marianas Islands to scoop out coral runways and hardstands for the long-range bombers that leveled the biggest cities of Japan. He volunteered for that job also.

Mrs. Latta-Lawrence Files Reply in Suit

Counsel for Mrs. Elene Latta-Lawrence filed papers in District Court yesterday opposing motions on behalf of her husband, Capt. Alexander Latta-Lawrence, which seek to strike certain allegations from the wife's maintenance suit.

The 47-year-old Navy captain's motions asked the court to eliminate allegations referring to Representative Edith Nourse Rogers, Republican, of Massachusetts, who Mrs. Latta-Lawrence's suit charged was the cause of her marital difficulties.

Points and authorities filed on the wife's behalf yesterday through Attorneys David Cobb and I. S. Weissbrodt asserted the allegations were "material and proper" specifying defendant's cruel and abusive treatment and desertion of plaintiff.

The papers also opposed defense motions to dismiss the action for an accounting and to strike out the wife's demand for a jury trial. The captain has charged that the separate maintenance suit brought by the wife last March was designed to hold him up to "contempt and public ridicule" and deprive him of his livelihood.

Mrs. Rogers has described Mrs. Latta-Lawrence's assertions her husband had been in "close and intimate" association with the Representative member as absurd and outrageous.
