After America and Germany severed diplomatic relations, Mrs. Dabell returned to the states and subsequently was assigned to Cuba, Rotterdam, Antwerp and Cairo. During the Cairo assignment she married and resigned from the service in 1934. She was asked to return in 1940.

Because of her fluency in four languages — Spanish, German, Dutch and French—the department was most anxious to have her assist with the refugee and displaced persons problems brought on by World War II.

She then served in Havana Mexico City, Cairo and Dublin and since 1952 has been with the Foreign Service Institute.


