O'Boyle Appeals for Gifts

To Aid Needy Overseas

The Most Rev. Patrick A. O'Boyle, Archbishop of Washington, has appealed to Catholics to give generously to the annual Laetare Sunday collection which will be taken at all masses tomorrow.

The appeal was made in a pastoral letter emphasizing that the collection is to provide needed food, clothing, shelter, medicine and other necessities for millions of war refugees overseas.

"Your generous offering to the Bishop's welfare and emergency relief collection on Laetare Sunday is like sending your personal representative among the dispossessed, the wanderers, the homeless, the unfed, the unclothed," Archbishop O'Boyle said.

LENTEN STUDY OF BIBLE IS THOUGHTFUL PURSUIT—These people, among the 1,800 attending special Lenten Bible study classes at the Lutheran Church of the Reformation, find it a fitting period to get reacquainted with the Bible.

Lutherans Note Rise in Lenten Study Sessions

The Lenten season is not only a period of fasting but of highly organized study for the congregation of the Lutheran Church of the Reformation, 212 East Capitol street.

Wednesday evening study classes throughout Lent are, in fact, a well-established institution of the big white stone landmark of Capitol Hill. They were initiated many years ago by Dr. Oscar Fisher Blackwelder, former pastor, now pastor emeritus of the church.

Response has always been gratifying, according to Dr. Lawrence D. Folkemer, who has carried on the Lenten classroom idea since Dr. Blackwelder's retirement last year.

Attendance Soars
This Lent, Pastor Folkemer notes, class attendance has soared well above all previous years.

"More and more of our members—and a number of non-members—seem to share our

feeling that Lent is the season particularly fitted for discussion and study of the Bible," he said.

The current courses are in three categories: "Learning to Make the Bible Live," "Resources for Personal Religion," and "The Lutheran Church Faces Its Tasks."

Not only Lutherans teach the courses. So far members of the Episcopalian and Presbyterian Churches have participated.

Some of the leading names in the local religious world, moreover, have served as class instructors during the current series, which still has three more Wednesdays to go. Among these are Dr. Clifton Olmstead, executive officer of the Department of Religion, George Washington University, and Dr. Frederick E. Reissig, executive secretary of the Washington Federation of Churches.

Courses Are Informal

The courses are chatty and informal. One, for example, amounts to an analysis of the literary style and construction of selected chapters of the Bible which members have found helpful in their understanding of the great words.

Dr. Folkemer draws particular satisfaction from the fact that the people attending the Lenten courses travel from far-flung sections of the city, Virginia and Maryland points as far away as Laurel. Of the total 1,800 mem-

bership, only 25 live within walking distance of the church, the pastor pointed out.

What prompts the members to come to the Lenten classes? Interviews with a number of them give these typical answers:

Mrs. Nolan R. Best, 2014 Wardman road, Avondale, Md.—"I have a practical, as well as spiritual purpose. I teach Sunday School for juniors, and like any teacher I need continuing study of the subjects I teach. From a personal standpoint, I feel it is more important to know how to read the Bible than any other literature that helps in your daily living and daily work."

Miss Frances Menges, 1217 South Oakcrest road, Arlington—"The classes are inspirational. We're a prayer group in church and I am anxious to learn methods used by other groups in studying for prayer."

Daniel J. Anderson, 4411 Lowell street, N.W.—"The studies are giving me a new appreciation of the Bible. I am also ex-

periencing the pleasure of knowing that my 12-year-old daughter is getting something out of participation in week-night church services."

Miss Hope Harding, 1344 East Capitol street—"I finally joined the church after having failed to attend for too many years, and since that time I've been thinking more and more about personal religion and prayer. I have seen what prayer means to others and realize what it can mean to me."

Joseph F. Wheeler, 204 South Irving street, Arlington—"Learning the Bible better for an interpretation and understanding of the writings of the past masters refreshes the mind. I just feel that things of this type are good for us."

Miss Bea Shelton, 4850 MacArthur boulevard N.W.—"Like a lot of people, I feel that I never really knew how to read the Bible. I know I have never read it enough. These classes are getting me interested in reading the Bible more."
