POLICE OBEY ORDERS AND STOP SALE OF THE DAY BOOK ON STANDS OF CHICAGO

Circulation Manager and Newsboys Arrested—Mayor Harrison Issues Order Restoring The Day Book to News Stands—A Day Book Man Slugged.

The loop police obeyed orders yesterday and tried to prevent the sale of The Day Book on newspaper stands, and thus suppress free speech and a free press in Chicago.

They kept The Day Book off of some stands because the boys were afraid to disobey police orders; and thus prevented the boys from supplying the public demand for a fearless newspaper:

They arrested the circulation manager of The Day Book and one newsboy for selling copies of The Day Book near newspaper stands where the owners refused to dis-

play The Day Book for sale.

The policeman who arrested The Day Book circulation manager and took him to the station in a patrol wagon, also struck him on the head and handled him roughly.

When the circulation manager told an assistant to take a policeman's number, that policeman grabbed the assistant on the charge of taking his number.
