"REMEMBER LUDLOW!" WAS THE CRY OF MINERS IN WALSENBURG BATTLE

*Gen. Don MacGregor, Who Commanded Labor's Army,
Tells Story of Great Fight—"We Didn't Fight
for Revenge, But To Prevent An-
other Ludlow."*

(One of the battles fought Wednesday, April 29, in the hills of Colorado, when the maddened strikers set out to drive the Rockefeller gunmen from the district, was on the heights of Walsenburg. The dispatch said that Don MacGregor, a newspaperman well known in Chicago and Denver, was in command all day of this successful fight. McGregor was asked to tell about the battle for this newspaper. The following is his account.—Editor.)
