BELGIANS REPULSE GERMAN ARMY---KAISER'S WAR AIRSHIP WRECKED

Twenty-six Dashed to Death When Shell Bursts Envelope of Dirigible — German and Russian

Cruisers Fight to the Death—Both Sink.

New York.—U. S. official treasure ship, cruiser Tennessee, lying off Tompkinsville, awaiting orders to sail for Europe. Has aboard \$10,000,000 in gold.

Calais, France.-German tank steamer Czar Nich-

olas brought into port by French destroyer.

London.—Heavy firing at sea reported at several points on British coast. Not believed any decisive naval engagement has been begun.

Brussels.—German dirigible wrecked by Belgian fire. Twenty-six members of crew dashed to death.
