WORKING GIRLS SCORE VICTORY AT MEETING OF 8-HOUR DAY BODY

Testimony on Evils of Overworking Women Impresses
Legislative Committee—Jane Addams Proves
Good Witness For Girls.

WOULD A RICH MAN CONSIDER IT A LIVING WAGE?

Chairman Walsh of the U. S. industrial relations commission, put this one to Julius Kruttschnitt, big railroad man, today: "Do you consider \$60 a month enough for an American workingman to keep an ordinary family on?"

The heavy-paunched multi-millionaire answered: "Well, that depends on what the ordinary workingraan considers a living. I can perhaps answer it best by saying that there are thousands and thousands doing it and educating their children, too." On purely scientific facts, without the remotest sentimental appeal, the proponents of the proposed 8-hour legislation for women introduced testimony before the 8-hour legislative committee this morning, showing the absolute necessity of shorter working hours for women.

Dr. Henry B. Fabian, 122 S. Michlegan blvd., testified to the abnormal strain put upon working women in factories and other occupations where the work is monotonous and incessant, and he said there could be no question of its effect upon the nervous system of women and upon the coming generation.
