ONE KILLED, MANY HURT, IN STANDARD OIL RIOT

Bayonne, N. J., July 21.—One man was shot to death, several others hit by stray bullets and many were seriously hurt by flying cobblestones in a riot in the street today between 1,500 striking employees of the Standard Oil company and 100 policemen.

Windows were shattered for blocks around by flying missiles. The riot occurred in front of the Tidewater Company's plant.

Every policeman in Bayonne was rushed to the industrial section and the chief of police immediately swore in extra deputies.

One policeman's horse was shot from under him in the melee. The police were instructed not to fire on the strikers.

Approximately 5,000 men are on strike here today. A crowd gathered early before the Tidewater plant and attempted to rush the special police guarding the company's gates.

The police first fired over the heads

of the crowd, but that failed to stop the rush and they then shot low into the crowd. Many were shot in the legs.

Practically all of the strikers were foreigners, mostly Hungarians. In the crowd that surged about the plant this morning were scores of women. The women proved harder to handle and pacify than the men.

A short time before the crowd attempted to rush the plant a mob attacked fire house number four, but was driven off.

Police Lieut. Daniel Cady was struck with a broken bottle and severely wounded in the ankle. When an ambulance shot through the mob and it became known that Cady was in it, the crowd attacked it and damaged it considerably.

Every roof on the street was crowded with men during the street fighting. They bombarded police with missiles as they strove to get through to the plants.

The men have demanded a 15 per cent increase in wages, which the company refuses to grant.

"WHY PROSPERITY AIN'T HERE"
