Next to the great work of "Speedy" Rush, the new Princeton coach, the factor that has stood out most in the success of the Princeton eleven has been the play of Dave Tibbott, half-back. He is called the greatest half-back to wear the Tiger stripes in years.

Tibbott has not only starred in tearing lines to pieces or advancing through open fields, but in kicking field goals. He is expected to do more great work Saturday when the Tigers go against Harvard in the first game of the series between the "Big Three"—Harvard, Princeton, Yale.

The Tiger halfback will be especially matched against Eddie Mahan, Harvard captain, who is a second Brickley in kicking field goals.

In most of the "Big Three" games of recent years the elevens have been so evenly matched and the scoring of touchdowns so hard, victory has been a matter of a field goal or two.

The coming Tiger-Crimson battle may develop into another kicking affair in which the educated toe of Mahan or Tibbott may mean victory.

Princeton has not been beaten, while Harvard has been trimmed by Cornell. That gives the Tigers the edge in the race for the eastern championship.

The Tigers are rated away above the Yale eleven, which has already lost three games, so victory for the Tigers Saturday will just about cinch the title for them, as they will be big favorites to trounce the Bulldog the following week.

Tibbott and Capt. Glick were held out of the Tiger lineup last Saturday in the game with Williams. The idea was to save them from chances of injury before the Harvard game.

The week before, however, Tibbott was a bear against Dartmouth. He

kicked two field goals in the first period, one from the 35-yard line and the other from the 43-yard line. Later he scored a touchdown and kicked two goals from touchdowns.

UNIONS COME TO AID OF THE GARMENT WORKERS

More than \$45,000 has been paid out of the treasury of the Amalgamated Garment Workers' union in strike benefits, according to information given out at headquarters. From \$15,000 to \$20,000 is being expended weekly. "We are prepared to go the limit," strikers declare.

Unions are donating portions of their funds to help the strikers and so far no one has refused aid.
