## **WANTS NEIGHBORS OF WAYWARD BOYS ON WELFARE BODY**

**Judge Scully Says Social Workers Do Not Understand  
Conditions—Criticises Committee Which Does  
Not Seek Advice From Labor Men.**

The bad boy problem of Chicago was considered by 67 social service workers yesterday in the courtroom of the boys' court. Judge Harry M. Fisher, who presides over the court, explained the needs of boys who come into the court and made an appeal for preventative crime measures.

Judge Thos. F. Scully, first judge of the boys' court, threw a bomb into the meeting when he declared social service workers incompetent to deal with the problem.

"I have heard considerable talk about the responsibility of the parents since I have been here," Judge Scully said. "There is too much going into the homes by people like those assembled here who do not understand the people they seek to instruct.

"I live right amongst them. It is necessary to live amongst them to understand their needs. If you want a committee to really deal with this problem you should go into the dis-
