STOCKHOLDERS OF LA SALLE ST. BANK LIABLE—CENTRAL TRUST IS NOT

Springfield, Ill., April 19.—Stockholders of the defunct La Salle Street Trust and Savings Bank, who were stockholders when the bank collapsed, are liable for double the amount of their stock in payment of claims against the bank. This was the ruling of the court today in the now famous case.

The court further rules that stockholders who saw the crash coming and got out from under are not liable. The Central Trust Company of Chicago is not liable, the court holds, for any amount of the \$1,250,000 which it issued in cashier's checks to the La Salle street concern.

Justices Craig and Carter dissented from the opinion as to the liability of the Central Trust Co. and the trustees of the Elwood estate and Elbridge Haney.
