Adjourned Session is Held to Wind Up the Affairs of Old Administration.

District Court-Big Damage Suit-Marriage of Miss Moench-Local News Notes.

The city council met in adjourned sesslon at \$:30 o'clock p. m. last night with all the members present except Couneilmen Cullen and Williams. The mayor-elect and councilmen-elect had been invited and all were present except Messrs, Carr and Jones. After the reading of the minutes John

Wheelwright was allowed \$25 as a refund on the amount paid for the use the city hall square last winter as s skating pond.

On report of the special committee the funeral expenses, and the back salary due the late Capt, W. A.Brown, amount. ing to \$250, were appropriated in full ettlement of all claims against the

City Recorder Anderson presented a warrants which had been uncalled for in the recorder's office during the four years ending Dec. 31st, 1897, a total of \$79.22. A motion to publish the list was lost, and it was afterwards ordered filed.

City Attorney E. M. Allison, Jr., presented a lengthy report of the labors of the attorney's office for the year 1899, giving a detailed history of fourteen cases pending or settled in the courts n which Ogden city is interested. long and interesting exhibit of the status of the case of Ogden city vs the Rear River Irrigation and Ogden Water Works company was read. The report was accepted and ordered filed. Poll Tax Collector Moroni Poulter re-

ported 168 labor taxes paid and 94 cash oll taxes collected during the months of November and December, and submitted a list of 392 names of delinquents uncollected, with 69 names which were uncollectable. His bill, amounting to \$78.60, for services was ordered paid. Street Foreman Jos. Sanders submitted a report showing the total appropriations for streets for 1899 to be

78.41, which was \$405.03 less than the amount expended in 1898. He reported 714 miles of streets graveled during the year. There had been 1,318 poil taxes, amounting to \$3,954, collected in labor,

showing a decrease for the year of 127 taxes, or \$381. The sprinkling of eigh-teen miles of streets, including five new sprinklers, had cost for the year \$5,149.38, which was an increase over 1898 of \$1,650.58. He recommended that next year additional stand pipes be erected
