ing of the Woman's club was held at the club rooms in the county building, After the business meeting, Mrs. A. B. Kinney gave an interesting talk on Peter the Great, from his birth to the grave. She prefaced her remarks with the statement that a careful examina-tion of his life work left one in doubt as to his greatness. That the flattering stories of his precoclousness, his genstories of his piecoclousness, his gen-ius and courage, were legends. His de-bauchery and cruelty were something awful, especially at the revolt of the Strelitzes, all of whom he ordered put to death, assisting the executioners with his own bands. He pardoned only a few-young Orloff among them. Af-ter Ivan, in 1689, abdicated his share of the government, the new czar-aided by able minister-reorganized the army, built a small navy, went to sea in person in a Dutch and English ship to learn the practical part of naviga-tion.
