VACCINATION OF CATTLE. Can be Rendered Immune from Tuberculosis.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 23.-Dr. eonard Pearson, dean of the veteri-Leonard Pearson, dean of the veterinary department of the University of Pennsylvania, today announced that experiments covering a period of more than two years had proven conclusively that cattle may be rendered immune from tuberculosis by vaccination. The experiments, Dr. Pearson stated, were conducted by Dr. S. H. Gilliand and himself. The vaccination consisted of injecting into the veins of the animal

of injecting into the veins of the animal a small quantity of a preparation of tubercle bacilli non-virulent for

tubercle bacilli non-virtuent for cat-tle. This procedure was repeated sev-eral times, with gradually ascending quantities. The immediate effect was to produce a passing fever following each injection, which did not seriously annoy the animal.

To prove the efficacy of this treat-ment four healthy animals were seized and two were vaccinated. Then the four were inoculated with virulent

four were inoculated with virulent tubercle bacilli. At the expiration of nearly a year the inoculated cattle were killed. The two animals that had been vaccinated were perfectly sound, while the unvaccinated animals were

extensively tubercular.

Mr. Pearson stated that he intends devoting his energies to perfecting the method used in the vaccination.

After telling of the importance of good reading for children, Dr. Hirsch referring to Sunday school stories said: "There is not a single note in this trash that rings true to life or char acter of the child. In these books at sorts of impossibilities are caimly as sumed, and God is dragged into then in the role of a brutal and bungling policeman. There are no words in the pcliceman. There are no words in the Anglo-Saxon tongue that would adequately characterize their stupidity.

"The Sunday school books are worse than any dime novel. Their theology is damnable and their morality is below the freezing point. Even if they were not liable to these objections they should be condemned for their literary style, for they contain so much bad grammar and baby talk that they are a cruel infliction on the child."
