Sad Fate of Young Hyrum Nelson-Sufferings

Of His Rescuers.

Young Man Was Being Brought Home Sick, but Died on the Way of Cold and Exposure.

Heber, Wasatch Co., March 19 .- While trapping in the mountains near the headwaters of the Duchesne river, Hyrum Nelson, the 19-year-old son Wilford Nelson, who lives near this city, perished from cold and exposure last Sunday, while two companions, half frozen and almost exhausted, tried to drag him on a sled over the snow-covered mountains to a settlement 37 miles away. His companions, says a Herald special, Daniel Nelson and Thomas Wright, after enduring untold hardships and exposure, got lost in the mountains and were saved from a similar fate only by the perseverance of other rescurers who went in search of

Wright wandered for miles down an icy river in a semi-conscious condition found Monday afternoon How Daniel Nelson managed to reach the settlement he himself cannot tell. Thomas Wilde found the dead boy's body and got back to the settlemen almost exhausted and suffering from

frozen fingers.

The two Nelson boys are cousins. They had been camping about four miles from the Gold mountains, near the head of the Duchesne, when Hyrum was taken sick. On Saturday last his condition became serious and his cousin started for the settlement to get aid for him. Weak from his long tramp across the mountains, Daniel staggered up to the house of T. J. Larrabee Saturday evening, and telling of his cousin's illness, asked for assist-Mr. Larrabee fitted the young man out with supplies and sent Thomas Wright, who was visiting him, back to the camp with him.

A NIGHT IN THE SNOW,

All night the men tramped over the snow-covered mountains, and at daybreak reached the camp. Hyrum was still alive, and they placed him upon a still alive, and they placed him upon a sled to make the journey to the settlement. Eating a light breakfast, the two men took the ropes of the sled and began their trip. They had traveled but 16 miles over the arduous road when Hyrum complained of being cold. and asked his companions to stop at a clump of trees and build a fire. He thought he could walk, he said, to get warm. The father of the dead boy and a man whose name is not known started immediately for the place where the sled had been left and brought the

remains to the ranch.
In the afternoon Wright was found, and the three men, who suffered severely from exposure, are now being cared for by a physician. Their condition is not serious.


