The doubt as to how far President Taft is behind the moves that have been made by Senator Crane and some of his associates still exists. The president has been regarding with interest the reports of the various moves as they have been made, but has made no public comment upon any phase of the situation. There is every likelihood that his silence will continue. It is known, however, that Mr. Taft's mail has increased by leaps and bounds during the last week and that his official clipping bureau has been busy with cial clipping bureau has been busy with an accumulation of favorable editorial comments on reports emanating from

It is said the coming week will be marked by significant steps in the plan for the fall campaign. Some of those undoubtedly favor the plan that found its first public announcement last week, while others undoubtedly will favor the "old order of things."



Gaynor of New York city as he was shot Aug. 9 on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse reeled and would have fallen to the deck but for Benjamin Clarke Marsh, secretary of the committee on congestion of population of New York, who was reaching forward to grasp the mayor's hand. Mr. Marsh grabbed the wounded man, holding him up. The photograph shows Mayor Gaynor being held with the blood streaming from his wound immediately after the shooting. The photographer was about to take a picture of the executive before he sailed for a month's vacation in Europe. The picture is unique in the history of the shooting of prominent men in that it was taken before the wounded man realized what had occurred and before the assailant had been felled to the deck by Commissioner William Edwards of the department of streets. The picture shows the blood on Mayor Gaynor's face and the horrified look on the face of the man in front of him.
