SORRY THE OLD MAN DIED." Congressman Allen Tells Claveland a Story to Benefit Office Seekers.

Washington City Letter. The representative had been to the White House several times in behalf of some applicants for effice, and each time he had been sent away empty handed. "No," said Mr. Allen, "I den't think you want to know." The president insisted, and then Mr.

Allen told this story:
"Down in my district," he said, "I had a client who died suddenly. I was executor of his estate. About six months after his death his son came to me and said that he was awfully hard up, and he would like to get a little money, if he could, out of the property. I sold him that he would have to wait until the year was out, and then if the indebtedness was straightened out the estate would be settled up. Six months later he came to see me. 'Well,' I said, when he came in. 'I cannot do anything for you today. There is some litigation over the estate, and I have to go into court and defend the suits.
