THE REPORT OF MAYOR SMITH.

We present in full in this issue the annual report of the Mayor. It is a good statement and one for taxpayers to read and ponder.

The finances of the city are in excellent condition. One year ago the city was staggering under an indebtedness of \$24,641. There was no money in the Treasury. The paper issued was at a discount of 20 per cent. and over. In R Burns..... 8.00 the way of interest \$2273 were paid. There was talk even of repudiation among those not over scrapulous on questions of honor and honesty, on account of the debt exceeding the limit fixed by law. As compared with this year, the assessment roll was smaller. the people were poorer and fewer, and a feeling was manifest not so good as that now pervading the community. What is the situation at present! The Mayor reports the municipal indebted ness \$15,975 on the 30th of June, 1881. Here is a reduction at once of \$8665. He also reports the interest burden \$1053, or less by \$1220 than the year before. Properly enough, he says nothing whatever about increase popu lation and wealth, nor speculates in any manner as the future. This at left | Kellogg & Anderson ...... for the reader and citizens. We fancy that a common idea will be that should no unforeseen accident occur, every eleven thousand (of principal and interest) dollars were paid during the past year.

The showing made by the Mayor for the city is gratifying. We commend it tion for watering the streets. It was to his successor and to the incoming Common Council. It will not be out of place also to refer the County Commissioners to it, for, during the past year, the county has increased its indebtedness quite as rapidly as that of the city has been diminished.

It would seem, therefore, that with proper management the city indebtedness may be suffi-ciently reduce i to bring up the scrip of the differ-ent funds to the cash value of one hundred cents on the dollar, and thus the city will save a con-siderable sum which is now paid in the form of interest, which is "a consummation devoutly to

There are evidences on every hand of the stealy growth of the city in wealth and population, and a consequent increase in current expenses. It will be necessary for those who may be called to administer the city government to be watchful and keep the expenditures within the income. It was cause for congratulation last year that your produces were to a hait in the matter of inpredecessors came to a halt in the matter of increasing the expenses of the city. Allow me, gentlemen, to congratulate you that you have to be hoped that is to be hoped that your successors will do as well, which they may do, and even better.

The amount of interest paid last year was t vo thousand two hundred and seventyt-hree dollars, which has been reduced this year to one thousand and fifty three dollars, a difference of twelve hun-

dred and twenty dollars, which sum has been saved to the treasury.

The duties of Harbor Master and Fire Warden have been performed by the City Marshal, and the sum of three hundred and ten dollars has been paid for permission to discharge ballast, which sum has this year been paid into the treasury, whereas heretofore it has been paid to the Harbor Master for his services.

The amount of work done on the streets I think The amount of work done on the streets I think will not suffer in comparison with any other year either in amount of work done, or in the amount

expended for such work.

In the near future the question of water support for the city will be agitated, and at the proper time, when the different projects have been fully canvassed, I have uo doubt but the subject will receive a careful consideration by those then having the matter in charge. It will therefore be premature for me to make any recommendation

in regard to the matter at this time.

It is with a good deal of pleasure that I am able to say that the books of the Clerk and Treasurer are kept in an admirable manner as any one may see upon inspection. These officers have always been able at a moment's warning to give an exact statement of the condition of the finances, without any discrepancy in their accounts, thus showing a commendable degree of praiseworthiness in the discharge of the duties of their offices. There is only one lawsuit now pending to which the city is a party, and that is a suit brought by Louis R. Flowers, claiming one thousand dollars damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained by walking off the sidewalk.

I have no further communication to make, gentlemen, in reference to the effect of the city.
