**END OF THE ERUPTION.**

The Commercial Advertiser gives us  
the account following of the end of the  
great lava overflow of the past eight or  
ten months:

Hilo has not been engulfed and  
overlaid with lava—to provide a  
Pompeii or an Heracleum for Ha-  
waiian exhumers of A. D. 3881. How-  
ever, there would not have been much  
of Hilo for the observation of future  
excavators if Madam Pele had taken  
the matter seriously in hand. There  
would not probably have been a splin-  
ter found to mark the sites of temples  
of Christian faith, or of Justice; or the  
mansions of a Coan, a Severance, a Ly-  
man, or a genial Captain Tom Spencer;  
or of any other relic of the fair tropic  
city, seated on its hillside of beauty,  
had the lava come down in earnest.

The great fire mountain, after belch-  
ing forth red hot molten lava that  
amounted in volume to an area ten  
miles square, and several hundred feet  
high—or about the extent of Kaho-  
lani—after running over sixty miles in  
its course, and after flowing to a point  
where it had not flowed before—per-  
haps in a thousand years—stopped  
short within eight hundred yards of  
Hilo. Why it stopped cannot be an-  
swered by any science or observation of  
man. Some will believe in the efficacy  
of prayer in this instance; and let not  
anyone, who knows no more than the  
believing, endeavor to unsettle the as-  
surances of faith. However, the won-  
derful flow has stopped, much to the  
inexpressible relief and delight of  
Hiloites, and of all the country, with  
the exception of some tourists who  
missed the conflagration they went to  
see. To witness a city overwhelmed by  
a volcano has not been observed  
since the first century; and it must  
have been rather disappointing, when  
in the nineteenth century a city was  
imminently threatened with being  
overwhelmed, and the overwhelming  
did not come off. However, recent  
tourists to the lava flow have been com-  
pensated by the witnessing of a great  
many volcanic sights and demonstra-  
tions, and like nearly all visitors to  
volcanic phenomena, have to relate a  
series of hairbreadth escapes, evidences  
of their daring, hardihood and adre-  
nalin—such as looking into hell like  
holes with lava jets pouring  
around the person like a fiery hail on  
a burning plain; or springing from  
ledge just as it crumbled down into a  
seething cauldron of incandescence; or  
leaping a fiery chasm whilst sulphur-  
ous fumes scorched off side whiskers;  
or crossing a red-hot crust of a recent  
flow, and burning off boot soles. These  
are some of the experiences compen-  
sating tourists for missing the conflag-  
ration and overwhelming of a city.  
It would have afforded an interesting  
prominence in a man's history to have  
it said of him, "He saw the last of  
Hilo." But it was not to be; and Hilo  
must fulfill its mission of providing, as  
it is earnestly hoped, by hotel or other  
wise for successive hordes of tourists  
that shall come from the farthest ends  
of the earth to see how near she was  
being swallowed up.

The lava flow from Mokuawao to  
Hilo of 1881 is now a congealed stream  
throughout its length; and should a  
fresh outbreak of the volcano take place  
at the same vent, it would have to find  
a new channel. The late flow of lava  
is now a tortuous line of petrification,  
with extraordinary crevasses and cavers  
throughout its entire length; and in  
two or three years all this surface of  
granite, twisted and serpentine surface  
will be covered with lichens, mosses  
and ferns preparing the way for a fuller  
development of vegetation; and all the  
ragged-edged crypts, chasms and re-  
cesses along the burning route will, in  
a little while, be fringed and adorned  
with a lovely vegetation, so that the  
daintiest feet may tread there, and the  
loveliest hands be delighted in cutting  
the choice cryptograms of these isles.  
The most of the surface of grand vol-  
canic Hawaii—especially that of Puna,  
Kau and Koha—presents a variety of  
curiously contrived grottoes, caves, chan-  
nels and interstices produced by vol-  
canic action. There are no doubt  
many subterranean caves, miles in ex-  
tent, yet to be discovered; and in some  
certain arcane of Hawaiian history  
may be revealed to a great historic and  
ethnic student and zealous exhum-  
er like Schliemann.
