## FORTS FOR PANAMA

Taft Will Se'ect Sites for Proposed Works.

CANAL WILL BE PROTECTED

Terminals of the Big Ditch Will Bo Made Impregnable by the Time the First Ship Crosses Through to the Pacific-Secretary Starts Early.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17 .-Fortification of the terminals of the Panama canal will be one of the subjects considered by Secretary Taft when he makes his visit to the isthmus and for this purpose he will be accompanied by members, of the first committee of the Taft fortifications beard.

Fortification of the canal was forbidden by the first Hay-Paunceforte treaty, but this treaty was amended so much by the Senate that Great Britain rejected it. The canal treaty which was finally adopted and is now in force and which superseded the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, makes no men. tion of fortifications, but does allow the United States to use such military force as may be necessary to police and protect the canal.

As nothing is said regarding fortifications this government assumes the right to erect such works as will adequately protect the canal. It is not expected that the present investi gation will result in more than a pre liminary upon the conditions at each terminal of the cruit,

the Isthmian canal commission and the board of consulting engineers returning fro a tour of inspection of the Panama canal arrived here today,

General George W. Davis said that the board might report its opinion of the best kind of canal in two or three weeks. There are 2,600 men at work now.


