



BOYHAS NARROW ESCAPE PRIZE FIGHTERS ARE ? SENT TO GRAND JURY

Runaway Horse Drags Carlton Phillips Along Street.

HIS FOOT HANGS IN STIRRUP

Takes Fright-Lad is Badly Injured, But His Recovery is Expected.

Cariton Phillips, Jr., a pupil in the Syms-Eaton Academy, whose home is about three miles from Hampton, narrowly escaped death in a runaway accident in North King street yesterday afternoon. The youth received painful injuries and the physicians are unable at this time to say whether there are internal injuries. He is bruised about the left side, shoulder and arms and suffered considerably from the shock.

Perilous Position.

Young Phillips, following his usual custom, started for his home at 3 o'lcock. He was riding a young colt and when the horse got near the office of Fay S, Collier, the animal became frightened and strated to run. The horse stumbled and the young fellow fell to the paved street. His left foot hung in the stirrup and he was dragged for about fifty yards betore the girth broke on the saddle, which saved the boy from a terrible death.

sible until Dr. J. Wilton Hope, the Phillips' family physician, took charge of the boy. Dr. Hope found that there is a slight congestion of the left lums and that the boy's injuries are very serious, although his recovery is now expected.
