DENVER, Col., October 13.—The following dispatch was received by Gov. Pitkin at 9:40 A. M. yesterday:

LAKE CITY, Col., Oct. 10.

To Governor Pitkin:

The following trustworthy news has been received from Los Pinos agency:

Sapavaneiro, one of the most reliable chiefs, who was sent by O'uray to the White River agency after the news of the fight had been received by him, returned from Milk River yesterday at 11 o'clock. He reports that he saw the white men and children at the White River agency in charge of Chief Douglass; also, one of the employees, who was present when the Indians made the attack upon the agency. This man killed one Indian and wounded another. Sapavaneiro thinks three or more employees are also alive, as their tracks were seen around the adjoining buildings, and they may flee to the woods. Father Meeker was killed. The report as given in the papers that Sapavaneiro and Shavano took part in the fight is untrue; and it is also not sure that Chief Douglass led the White River Utes. O'uray thinks that Jack, a White River Ute, commanded the Indians in the charge on Thornburgh's command.

THE WOMEN AND CHILDREN SAFE.

LOS PINOS INDIAN AGENCY, Colorado, October 9.—Employee Brady, who went to White River with the Indian escort under Chief Sapavaneiro, has returned. The Indians obeyed Chief O'uray's order mentioned a few days ago. As soon as it was communicated they ceased fighting and moved off. No further trouble is anticipated unless the soldiers advance. Chief Douglass sends word to O'uray that the women and children, the money and papers of the agency, will be sent here when it is safe to do so. O'uray does not believe all the employees are killed. He endorses the agent's dispatch to Washington for a peace commission to investigate the trouble, and let the blame rest where it belongs. A runner is just in from the southern Ute camp with a letter from the agent. A council has been held, and the Utes will abide by O'uray's orders. They want peace, and will have nothing to do with the White River trouble, and request O'uray to inform the White River Utes of their decision.

A Switchman's Blunder.

A TERRIBLE SMASH-UP ON THE MICHIGAN CENTRAL RAILROAD RESULTS IN A SCORE OF DEATHS AND AN ARMY OF WOUNDED.

DETROIT, Mich., October 10.—A serious accident occurred on the Michigan Central railroad, a short distance east of Jackson, about one o'clock this morning. The Pacific express train which left Detroit forty minutes late, collided with a switch engine on the main track at that place, telescoping the baggage and express cars and piling the remaining coaches, eleven in number, on top of each other. The first coach was filled with emigrants, most of whom were killed or seriously injured. Many of the occupants of the other coaches were also killed or seriously injured. The engineer and fireman of the express train were literally torn in pieces, but the engineer and fireman of the switch engine escaped injury by jumping from their engine. The train was made up of seven Wagner sleepers, four passenger coaches and the mail and baggage cars. The tender of the express engine was telescoped into the baggage car about half its length. This car in turn forced its way into the mail car and these crowded the first passenger coach to the right on the embankment and crushed back through the two following. The passengers in the first coach were comparatively unharmed, the harvest of death being reaped in the second and third coaches. The fourth coach escaped with slight damage, and none of the Wagner coaches were injured. As near as can be ascertained the accident was caused by the switchman having charge of the making up of freight trains at Jackson junction occupying the main track with the switch engine and caboose, he understanding that the Pacific express was considerably behind time. The express train, however, had made up nearly all the lost time.

Physicians and surgeons were at once summoned from Jackson to the scene of the disaster, and a special train carrying physicians left Detroit at 5 o'clock A. M. A large force of employees of the railroad company, together with a large number of citizens of Jackson, were promptly on the ground, engaged in the work of extricating the bodies from the wreck. Railroad officials and surgeons were also busy at work among the wounded, doing everything in their power to alleviate their sufferings. Up to noon eighteen dead bodies had been taken from the wreck, ten of whom, taken from the emigrant car have not yet been identified.

Elkins, Lowell, Mass.; Miss Annie Gartland, Mrs. Mary Gartland, William John Rice, and Mrs. Elizabeth Rice, Rhinelandia; Milton Gilbert, Detroit, engineer of the express train; Mrs. Green, Vt.; infant daughter of Mrs. George A. Jones, Shenandoah, Pa.; Louis Morgan, Buckingham, Canada; C. B. Smith, Jackson, fireman of the express train; Mrs. Catharine Spartline, Edith Spartline, aged 6, and Marion Spartline, aged 4, Westminster, Md.; unknown man, evidently a Canadian, 25 years old, five feet six inches in height, short black hair, smooth face, and dressed in gray checked suit; unknown man, supposed to be a sailor. He has on one arm the initials "G. E. R." and a device with the words "Faith, Hope and Charity." There were thirty-two persons injured.

The Fever's Work Last Week.

MEMPHIS, October 11.—The weekly medical summary shows that 74 cases of yellow fever have been reported—whites, 40; colored, 34; under 5 years of age, 11. Total number of cases reported to date, 1,421. Total deaths from yellow fever for the week, 22—whites, 15; colored, 6; Chinese, 1. Total deaths from yellow fever within the corporate limits to date, 425. Twelve new cases were reported to the Board of Health to-day, four of which were colored. Eleven deaths were reported.
