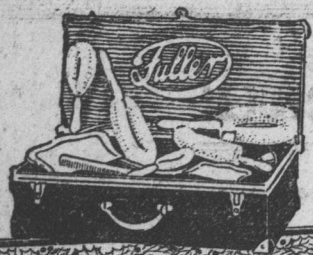
### N. A. A. C. P. CORRECTS SCHOOL BOARD'S STATEMENT

### MEN ROB DWELLING OF SILVER CREEK TRAPPER WHO BEFRIENDED THEM

George Thompson and John Budd, itinerants, were in the city jail Monday evening accused of the theft of a rifle and a sum of money from Henry Fritz, Jr., trapper, living in the Silver Creek district, who had befriended the men whom he claims returned to his house to rob him.

Fritz stated that he had fed and sheltered the men Sunday night and that they left his dwelling early Monday morning. The young trapper said he returned to his house after a short absence to find that his rifle and a small sum of money had been stolen. He suspected the two men who he had befriended and with the aid of Buford Olson succeeded in locating the men Monday afternoon.

The accused men protested their innocence, but were brought into Douglas, notwithstanding, and were turned over to Walter Morris, deputy sheriff, who gave them a severe grilling. Thompson finally admitted theft of the rifle and his companion, questioned separately, admitted stealing the money. The rifle was not located, Thompson claiming that some man to whom he had tried to sell the gun had taken it away from him. Investigating officers believe that cattlemen in the district recognized the rifle as belonging to Fritz and took it to return to him.

The two men are to be arraigned in justice court Wednesday morning.

### Alfonso De La Huerta In Bisbee Past Two Weeks, Report In Agua Prieta

It was reported in Agua Prieta Monday that Alfonso de la Huerta, brother of Adolfo de la Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, has been in Bisbee for several days.

Authorities at Agua Prieta believe that Alfonso de la Huerta's presence so near the border probably has some connection with the recent announced movement of Adolfo de la Huerta from Los Angeles that 20,000 armed men are in revolt in Mexico and looking upon the former provisional president as their prospective leader.

Alfonso de la Huerta was a general in the Mexican army during the time his brother was president and continued in the service of the army until the de la Huerta rebellion.

### Daring Thief Robs Room In Which Youth Sleeps

A particularly daring burglary was learned of Monday morning when Louis Jennings, son of Irving Jennings, proprietor of the Jennings Lumber company, reported to the local police department that a portable typewriter had been stolen Sunday night from the room in which he slept at his father's residence, 654 Eleventh street.

According to young Jennings, he heard no sound during the night but found upon arising Monday morning that his typewriter, a new portable model, had been stolen while he slept. Despite the fact that the typewriter and its carrying case were in different parts of the room, the thief took the time to locate the case so that the machine would be complete.

Margarita Lopez, alias Margarita Lizanoga, arrested recently by immigration inspectors at the local port was taken to Tucson Monday morning by Deputy U. S. Marshall Tom Sims to await trial in federal court for violation of the immigration laws.

### RIGHT OF WAY AT THE STREET INTERSECTION IS SUBJECT OF QUIZ

"Right of way at street intersections," is the subject of today's quiz in the series of questions and answers regarding Douglas-traffic ordinances which The Douglas Daily Dispatch is publishing for the information and guidance of its readers.

The question of right of way at intersections is one of the most important of the city's traffic regulations and arises almost daily in the cases of minor collisions. According to police officers, this particular regulation is one commonly misunderstood by motorists who profess to be familiar with the traffic ordinances.

Section No. 31 of the traffic ordinances of Douglas provides as follows:

"The driver of any vehicle within said city shall yield the right of way at the intersection of their paths, to a vehicle approaching from the right, unless such vehicle approaching from the right is farther from the point of intersection of their paths than the first named vehicle; and provided, however, that upon the approach of any ambulance or police vehicle from any direction, the driver of any vehicle shall immediately yield the right of way to such ambulance or police vehicle."

"What constitutes reckless driving?" will be the subject of Wednesday's traffic quiz.

### PROCLAMATION EXECUTIVE OFFICE, STATE HOUSE, PHOENIX, ARIZONA

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE W. P. HUNT, Governor of the State of Arizona, do hereby proclaim the month of December as the period for the nineteenth annual Christmas Seal Sale, and do hereby command the purchase and use of Christmas Seals as a ready, practical, and effective means of participation by the public in the organized movement for saving the lives and promoting the health and physical vigor of the men, women and children of Arizona.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the Capitol, this 25th day of November, 1926.
