Slater claims the fee simple to the soil, by virtue of a bona fide settlement, use and occupation of the land long before Cowan ever saw it. Upon this settlement a pre-emption was proven, and Slater was permitted to enter the land at Government price, which he did, and now holds the receipt of the Receiver of the Land Office at Jackson, Missouri, for the same. The United States have parted with the freehold. The question of title lies between Cowan and Slater, and the courts alone can determine them.

The undersigned will not notice further than this, to caution the inquirers, the false charges made by the contemptible J. E. Cowan against him and Slater, in the Madisonian of the 6th April, A. D. 1843. I refer to the Hon. L. F. Linn, and Hon. James H. Randall, members of Congress from Missouri, as to the standing of myself and Slater, where we are known.
