Mentreal, Quebec, April 8.—Evangelist Joly, painter and decorator, was arrested here yesterday charged with being the author of three mysterious burglarles committed at Joliet, Quebec, The first burglary took place in 1896, when \$6,000 was taken from the safe in the Canadian Pacific depot. A year later \$1,500 was stolen and the station building burned. In August, 1899, the station was robbed a third time, and \$7,000 was stolen.

Not a clew was left behind, but in the money stolen in the third burglary there was a bundle of Dominion \$1 notes which had come straight from the Receiver General, and of which the numbers had been preserved. A circular was sent out giving the numbers, and a clew was finally found which resulted in Joly's arrest. The officers claim to have found incriminating evidence. Joly's residence was found well equipped with revolvers and a rifle, while in his pockets was another big revolver and
