#### Becker's Case Continued.

case of John H. Becker, who is charged with attempting to bribe Jury Comnissioner Weinbrenner, was continued until June 9 in the Court of Criminal Correc tion yesterday. When it was called Tom Rows, the attorney for the defense, offered two motions. One of them was to guash the special jury, which had been selected by Mr. Weinbrenner, who is the prosecuting witness. The other motion was to dismiss the moreedings, as the indictment charged that Becker "did feloniously attempt" to bribe, when the charge was only a misdemeanor.

Prosecuting Attorney Clover argued the use at length, when Judge Clark overruled the motion to dismiss the proceedings, de-claring that the indictment was drawn under a felony statute. When it was found to be a misdemeanor charge, the indictment was then forwarded to the Court of Criminal Correction, which has jurisdiction over

Judge Clark sustained the motion to dismiss the special jury. He then gave minute instructions for the selection of the next jury. He ordered that one of the deputies in the Jury Commissioner's office who is not a witness in the case select from the tury list 300 names of men of recognized ability qualifying them to sit as special jurors and place the names, written on separate slips of paper, in a box. The slips of paper are to be shuffled and then the deputy is to draw out, one at a time, slips of paper until he has seventy-five names. This list is to be summoned for the venire in the Becker case. These instructions were given to the Sheriff, who must deliver them


